Nuremberg's Catholic Days.

The reader may get another insight into the culture and scholarship that characterized Germany before the Re formation in the illustrated article "The Nuremberg of the Master-Singers," which George Willis Bardwell has in the current issue of Leslie's Popular Monthly. Therein we are told that to become a master-singer one must need be a scholar and in the told that to become a master-singer one must needs be a scholar, and in the list of rules governing the composition and rendering of a master-song there were thirty-nine faults enumerated, such as irreligious or low thoughts, false namer, bad Latin, incorrect pronunciation or accent, bad or defective rhymes and so forth, all of which, if

The Society of the Master-Singers was modelled after the medieval guilds and its membership included people of all callings.
