Desperate Stand by the Arabs-Piles Bead Natives Rotting on the Plain.

GRAHAM TO RESUME HIS ADVANCE TUES

Suakim, March 21 .- Gen. Graham has received the pipe line apparatus necessary te furnish his army with a full water supply during the march to Ber-ber. He starts Tuesday to make a permanent advance necessary to secure such occupation of the country as will permit the construction of the railway from Suakim to Berber.

A MOT WEATHER CAMPAIGN. Kerti, March 21 .- The Mudir Dengola is being joined by many friendly Arabs on his march up the Nile towerds Hassaniyet. The object of the Mudir's warlike activity is to disabuse hestile Arabs of the notion that hot weather will prevent aggressive opera-tions against the Mahdi.

Suakim, March 21.-Corrected re turns of the British losses in yesterday's engagement show that 21 were killed, including 17 Indian troops, and 42 wounded, 16 being of the Indian con-

The troops in the zareba at Hasheen at daylight this morning shelled and dispersed bodies of rebels on adjacent hills. The whole force, except the guards, will advance at daybreak tomorrow for the purpose of constructing zarebas at points seven or eight miles from camp. The Berkshire regiment and the marines will be left to garrison the zarebas, the re-

Suakim, March 22.-Unofficial estimates place the British killed at 52 and wounded 85. Nearly all the casualties were due to spear thrusts received in hand-to-hand fights. McNeil is blamed for not taking precautions against a surprise. SURPRISED BY THE ARABS.

Suakim, March 22 .- While detachments of English and Indian infantry were making a zareba seven miles southwest of Suakim today, they were sud-denly surprised by a rush of Arabs who had been massed and concealed in the defiles west of Hasheen. The British formed a square as quickly as possible, but camels, mules and horses were driven back in confusion on the troops, causing a stampede. Amid the clouds of dust the Arabs penetrated the south and north sides of the square. Meanwhile the Marines and Berkshire regiment, who were on the east and west sides of the square, maintained a continuous fire. holding the enemy at bay while a charge of cavalry and the fire from the guns at Hasheen zareba checked the onslaught of the Arabs, which at the outset threatened serious disaster to the British,

Gen. Graham reports the English losses as far as known, 2 officers and 22 men killed and 33 men wounded. Losses of the engineers and transport corps and Indian troops not reported.

DETAILS OF THE ATTACK.

SUAKIM, March 22. - The enemy began the attack at 3 this morning. They were repulsed and the ground cleared by 4. The damage to the transport materia yesterday is immense. The guards and artillery were sent to reinforce the besieged troops, and the whole British force mained in the field during the night. The camels and mules were ham strung by the Arabs. Scores of camp followers were cut up. The appearance of the yelling Arabs was so sudden that the whole assemblage of transport animals, mixed with natives, became panie-stricken, and surged on the zareba making resistance hopeless. The scene was indescribable. The Arabs fired and crept in all directions among the animals. The Haddendo sas sprang from the bush like magic, and attacked the zareba fiercely on all sides. Soudanese coolies were mistaken for enemies, and many were killed by their triends. The Berkwere killed by their triends. The Berkshire regiment and the Marines stood firm and cool, and fired volley after volley into the ranks of the enemy. The naval brigade inside the zareba opened a hot fire. The Indian troops held their ewn as soon as they were able to again close the square Eventually, being unable to stand the rattling fire, the enemy disappeared as they came. Gen. McNeil drew in all his forces and stood to arms. The Hussars brought in the wounded, menaced by the Arab camel force. The desert is dotted in, every direction with runaway animals. The enemy's loss must be heavy. The camp at Suakim was prepared for a renewal of the attack.

FIGHTING MARINES. SUARIM, March 23.—The enemy in yesterday's fight numbered 4,000. Their fanatical courage won admiration. They rushed to what seemed certain death repeatedly without faltering.
