

**Flies Across Channel With Passengers.**

**DEAL, England, Aug. 17.**  
It has been reserved for an American citizen to perform one of the most daring feats in the history of aviation. John B. Moissant, of Chicago, to-day flew across the English Channel to Teinastone with a passenger, and by this achievement far surpassed the rats of Berliot, De Lesseps and the unfortunate English aviator, Rolls, who later met his death at Bournemouth. The two man flight from France to England was the more astonishing as it was only a month ago that Moissant learned to fly, and made so few flights and was so little known among men that even his nationality was not disclosed. To make the feat more surprising Moissant was totally ignorant of the geographical part of the country. He had never been in England and was obliged to rely entirely upon the compass, while the crossing of the Channel was accomplished in the teeth of a strong westerly wind. The Channel flight was an incident in the aerial voyage from Paris to London. Moissant left Issy yesterday in company with Hubert Latham and reached Amiens in two hours. Latham's machine was wrecked, and this morning Moissant leaving Amiens at an early hour headed for Calais. Thousands who had gathered to watch the daring aviator were amazed, and urged him not to make the attempt in the face of the high gale that was blowing. He cared nothing for the warning of the people, and even the fact that there was no torpedo boat to follow in his wake but only a slow moving tug boat, did not deter him. He made the trip in 37 minutes. When he descended his eyes were bloodshot and greatly inflamed, as a result of the heavy rainstorm into which they drove on approaching the English coast. The high wind beat rain into the faces of the men like hail and almost blinded them. An average height of between 300 to 400 feet was maintained over the water. The aviator expected to land at Dover but was forced by the wind a few miles north and made the coast near Deal. The cold was intense, and both men were benumbed. Moissant seemed to take his feat as though it was a daily occurrence. When he revived sufficiently he said to an interviewer: "This is my first visit to England."

**The Cholera Scourge Increasing**

**ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 17.**  
The horrors of the cholera scourge in Russia, according to Prof. Rein, of the Red Cross, who has been sent by the Government to South Russia to study measures of combating the disease, are steadily increasing. Children are starving in many instances because their parents and adult relatives have been swept away by the disease, leaving them unsupported. There is no indication yet of the epidemic diminishing in vigor, and thousands of new cases are being registered daily. The official figures, according to reports, though immense in themselves, understate the full extent of the disease, owing to the impossibility of registering all cases.
