Spruce Brook—Eight trout caught to-day at Harry's Brook by Mr. Tilley staying at Log Cabin, guide, Jim Young, weight, five pounds.

Stephenville—About 7 p.m. yesterday Mr. W. J. Walsh, Insurance Agent, of St. John's, caught at the mouth of Harry's Brook, about a quarter of a mile from the station, a twenty pound salmon. This is the first in the brook this season.

South Branch—Three salmon caught in Big Salmon Pool to-day by R. A. Murray, one by Conductor Roseworthy, three in Fork Pool by tourist Campbell, weighing from nine to sixteen pounds, S. McIsaac, A. A. McIsaac and B. Cormier guides.

They went off fishing and as they did not turn up by 10 last night the young chap drove to the city without them. Jas. Dooley, a brother of the young man, procured a cab later in the night and went in search of them but returned at 8 a.m. to-day, his quest for the missing ones being fruitless. During the forenoon he and other men in another carriage again went in search of the missing ones and it is feared some mishap has befallen them.


