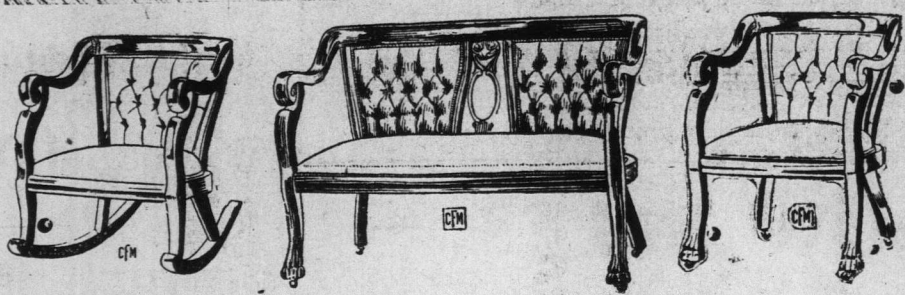

## ROBERT TEMPLETON

## At the House.

TUESDAY, May 11.  
Petitions were presented by Mr.  
Kent from the American Newfound-  
land Co.; the International Lumber  
Co.; the Labrador Pulp Co.; and the  
St. George's Lumber Co. on the mat-  
ter of the legislation before the  
House with regard to the Nfld. Pro-  
ducts Co.

Speaking to the petitions Mr. Kent  
explained to the House that in pre-  
senting them he had no personal in-  
terest in doing so, as they had been  
handed to him for presentation by  
the companies' solicitor. The pray-  
er of the petitions was that as the  
proposed legislation tended to lessen  
the value of their properties the coun-  
sels of the petitioners be heard be-  
fore the Bar of the House. A resolu-  
tion to this effect was moved by Mr.  
Kent, and carried.

Mr. Hickman gave notice of ques-  
tion with regard to public matters in  
the Bay de Verde District; and Mr. Win-  
sor on public matters in Bonaville  
District.

The Premier gave notice that on  
Monday next he would move the  
House into a Committee of the Whole  
for the consideration of certain re-  
solutions dealing with the Prohibition  
of the Sale and Importation of In-  
toxicating Liquors in the Colony.

The Standing Duties Bill passed the  
third reading.

The discussion of the Nfld. Pro-  
ducts Contract was deferred until  
Thursday, when the case of peti-  
tioners will be heard at the bar.

The Permanent Marine Disasters  
Bill passed the second reading with  
some amendments, and will come up  
for third reading this afternoon.

The Premier in introducing the  
Bill respecting Municipal Affairs re-  
ferred to the suspension of the City  
Council form of government for one  
year, granted last year on the peti-  
tion of some 2,000 voters of the munici-  
pality, and the subsequent ap-  
pointment of a Commission to en-  
quire into the best form of city gov-  
ernment with a view to the prepara-  
tion of a new charter for the city.  
The Board had been appointed and  
had given the closest attention to  
the most important problems of the  
city, such as the water service, the  
sanitary system and other matters  
that so to make up civic improve-  
ment. That their efforts had been  
fraught with success was apparent to  
all, and the energy exerted in the  
improvement of the city was most  
commendable. In the Bill now  
before the House they ask for an ex-  
tension of the term of the Commission  
months, so as to have time wherein  
to complete their report. This ex-  
tension is also considered to be in  
the best interests of the city as the  
year may, by this arrangement, be  
begun in January instead of July as  
heretofore.

Mr. Kent was of the opinion that  
the Bill before the House was only a  
necessary consequence to what had  
been done, and that when the gov-  
ernment of the city was by public re-  
quest, vested in a Commission. He  
praised the work done by the Board  
to date but had noticed by the report  
tabled that they had not finished the  
work assigned to them. He thought  
that the Board was merely one  
step towards the machinery to fill in  
the time while the Board was completing  
the task of a full charter of  
incorporation for the city. He be-  
lieved that the Board should be al-  
lowed to finish their work, and  
thought that the election of a new  
Council should be deferred until a  
new charter was introduced at the  
next session of the Legislature.

The Colonial Secretary took oc-  
casion to pay a tribute to the work done  
by the Commission since its incep-  
tion, and referred particularly to the  
improvements about to be made in the  
water service. He also was of the  
opinion that the Commission be given  
an extension of time to complete their  
work, but did not favor an undue ex-  
tension of time, and approved of the  
Bill in its present form.

Mr. Lloyd stated that he was not  
at any time in sympathy with a Com-  
mission form of government, on the  
nomination of the Governor in Coun-  
cil, but nevertheless was apprecia-  
tive of the good work done by the  
Board since taking charge of the af-  
fairs of the city. Though much good  
had been accomplished the instru-  
ment of government was to his mind  
entirely wrong, and tended to an  
oligarchic form of government. He  
hoped that the courage of conviction  
of the nominated councillors would  
prove an inspiration to the future  
councillors. The action of  
the Board in securing expert know-

ledge in the matter of water supply  
was a step in the right direction, a  
step in which the Commission has  
shown keen judgment. It is to be  
hoped, said Mr. Lloyd, that in the ful-  
lness of time they will bring in a bill  
well worth the attention of the House,  
but the granting an extension of time  
to December 31st is not sufficient, as  
after that date they lose all power  
as a Commission and may be suc-  
ceeded by a new Council elected under the  
old regime, that may not be in sym-  
pathy with the work of Commission,  
and may be called upon to finish  
their work and approach the legisla-  
ture. He would suggest that the  
Commission be retained in power un-  
til June 30th of next year for the com-  
pletion of a charter, so that the du-  
ties of the new Council may be  
clearly defined when they assume of-  
fice.

Mr. Higgins did not approve of a  
Commission form of government, but  
was not unmindful of the many im-  
provements made by the Board in the  
matter of water supply and general  
sanitation. He hoped that a complete  
report be made before a new Coun-  
cil was asked to take office.

Mr. E. J. Morris also praised the  
work of the Board and referred to the  
earnestness of the members, who  
were all busy men. He felt that they  
would be pleased to continue the  
work they had so well begun for 12  
months, if asked to do so.

Mr. M. J. Kennedy also contributed  
his quota of praise for the good done  
by the Commission and supported a  
twelve months extension.

Mr. Croker also was of the opinion  
that much improvement had been  
made, but he could not agree with the  
attitude of the Board with regard to  
the providing of labour for destitute  
citizens during the past winter. He  
favoured the extension of 12 months  
to permit of the drafting of a new  
charter.

Mr. Morine was of the opinion that  
a Commission could not manage the  
affairs of the city and prepare a  
charter at the same time, and ad-  
vocated the appointment of a com-  
mittee of say three legal gentlemen to  
assist the Commission in the pre-  
paration of the charter and the ex-  
tension of time until June 30th, 1916,  
and the election of the new Council  
under the projected charter.

The Bill will go into the Committee  
stage this afternoon.

The Premier then moved the House  
into a Committee of the Whole upon  
certain Resolutions relating to an  
agreement between the Government  
and the Newfoundland-American  
Packing Co. on the subject of cold  
storage. The discussion was pos-  
tponed until the House has the op-  
portunity of considering the resolu-  
tions.

The House adjourned at 6.30 p.m.  
until 8 o'clock this afternoon.

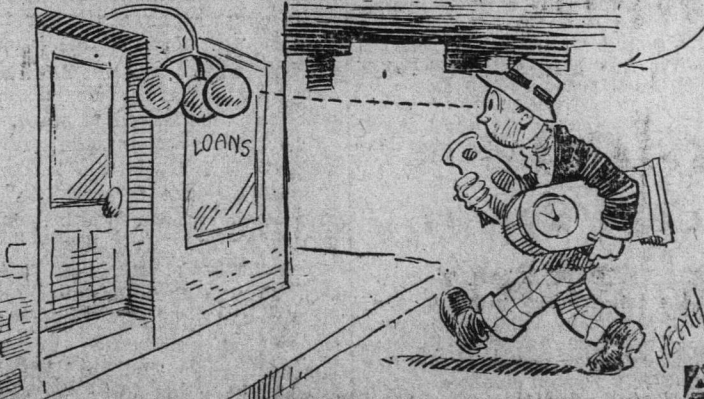
Breadboards should be scrubbed
