Previous to 9 A.M.

## GENERAL SITUATION UNCHANGED

LONDON, Sept. 19. Official to-night. The general situation is unchanged. South of the Ancre there was considerable artillery activity throughout the day. A local attack upon our trenches east of Marlinpich was easily repulsed. A hostile balloon was brought down by our artillery east of Ransart. In the neighborhood of Hill 60 an enemy ammunition store was exploded by our fire.

## NOTHING OF IMPORTANCE.

PARIS, Sept. 19. Owing to bad weather, says an official communication issued by the War Office to-night, nothing important has occurred except violent artillery activity on the Somme and Verdun fronts and about Dixmude in Belgium.

## TEUTONIC SUCCESS.

BERLIN, Sept. 19. The new line taken up by reinforced Russian and Rumania, between the Danube and the Black Sea, have been penetrated at several points by Teutonic forces, the war office announced to-day. Taking the offensive on the Stokod River yesterday, the Germans stormed a strong Russian bridgehead and drove the Russians across the river. The war office announced to-day that more than 2,500 Russians were captured as well as 17 machine guns.

## BELGIAN TOWNS FINED.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19. A London despatch to the News Agency to-day says: The Germans have fined the Belgian towns of Jemappes sur Sambre and Monastir sur Sambre \$10,000 each, because enemy fliers dropped bombs in the vicinity, said the Berne wireless despatch to-day.

## CHARGES OF ESPIONAGE.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 19. According to a press despatch from Maastricht to-day sixty-two persons have been placed on trial at Hasselt, Belgium, on charges of espionage, of whom 25 were condemned to death on Friday last. It is rumored, the advices say, that these persons including Goleitvaux, Burgomaster of Namur have already been executed.

## ALLIES NOT SATISFIED.

NEW YORK, Sept. 19. A News Agency despatch from Athens to-day says that Foreign Minister Carapanos received congratulatory visits from all diplomats at Athens, except those of the Allies. This is the first despatch to pass the Anglo-French censorship at Athens, showing that the Allies are not pleased with the new Greek Foreign Minister.

## GREEK PRISONERS.

ATHENS, Sept. 19. Speaking of the Greeks made prisoners at Kavala, Forward (correspondent) says: "Only yriose are treated as prisoners who surrendered to the enemy. We know Premier Kato-goropoulos has taken steps with Germany for the immediate return of our soldiers with all their effects. If this demand is not at once satisfied the Government must consider the measures to be taken. King Constantine is said not to be ignorant of the contents of Forward's article."

## SERBIAN SUCCESS.

LONDON, Sept. 19. Serbian troops in Macedonia, after a night of desperate fighting developed success yesterday on the Kaimani-Calani range to the north of Lake Ostrovo says a Reuter despatch from Salonika to-day. At night they occupied the highest summit of a range, 2,500 metres in height, which the Bulgarians had been ordered to defend to the last moment. The Bulgarian counter attacks were completely repulsed. The despatch adds that the Serbian offensive is continuing successfully.

## A Soldier Answers Yorick.

Dear Sir,—I apologize for pushing myself into other people's business, especially when the matter would be treated with silent contempt by those most concerned. Still in the interest of Fair Play I think some answer ought to be made to the letter concerning the Pay and Record Office in London, signed 'Yorick.'

It may be taken for granted that I know, theoretically and practically, shall I say, as much about the branch of the service under discussion as Yorick, whoever he is.

Wishing to make enquiries about the drive of the 1st July, I visited this office with some friends, brother officers, who were interested in the regiment, and who wished to hear more about the people who had made such a name for themselves.

All expressed admiration of the organization there displayed. If I remember correctly the expression, "in every way worthy of the Regiment" was used. In short the outstanding feature that strikes one on a visit to this office is the striking efficiency of the organization.

This was a perfectly friendly and unassuming visit, and is only quoted to show the way the office strikes visitors who may be supposed to understand what they are looking at.

In quoting the non-arrival of a few post cards, letters, etc., Yorick is only ridiculous. I can myself show him an envelope with 10 re-addresses on it. This is not strange. In the course of a few months a man may be sent to join his regiment or reserve battalion in England; several courses of instruction, detachment duty, front, get wounded and sent to French hospital, English hospital, Convalescent Home, on leave and many other places.

When ancient history such as Gallop is drawn in, becomes sublime. Even Yorick may have learnt by this time that the surprise is not that a few things did not turn up, but that some things did.

Space does not permit me to dwell on the many objectionable statements in this letter by Yorick.

I will close by referring to Mr. Hugh Anderson.

The same position in other contingents, and in home regiments that Mr. Anderson holds in the Nfld. Regiment carries with it "Ipsa facto" a commission.

Whether Mr. Hugh Anderson is worthy to hold this position is a matter better left to his superior officers than to an "armchair critic" such as Yorick.

I may add that for such mud-slinging of this type, Yorick, instead of appealing to Shakespeare for his non de plume, might find one more suitable in the American Yellow Press.

## Is It Either of These?

We learn from different sources that the skeleton of a man found by William Sheppard, near George's Pond, West Coast, may be either Harry Greening, who disappeared at Steady Brook nine years ago, or a Lunenburg man, Langley, belonging to Malne, U.S.A., who worked in the old mills at Horwood's near Spruce Brook, and was last seen in the vicinity of George's Pond twelve years ago this fall. A private message received from St. George's states the skeleton to be about 6 feet 2 inches, and to have evidently been undisturbed for the past twenty years. Both Greening and Langley possessed muzzle-loading double-barreled guns, while the latest was supposed to be wearing skin boots. It was further reported that some years after Langley was seen in New York. He was supposed to be insured for \$1,000 in an American Insurance Co., and that for several years the claim made by his relatives was held over.

## Citizens' Committee Not to Blame.

Dear Sir,—There has been some criticism of the action of the Citizens' Committee in the matter of the plebiscite on the "Ward System." Permit me to point out that the only expense contemplated by the Committee in connection with the plebiscite was that entailed by the printing of a third set of ballots. The Committee never intended that the city should be put to the expense of a new election.

On April 20th I forwarded to the Premier copy of a resolution asking for a plebiscite on this question, and I hold his acknowledgment of the 22nd in which he promised to bring the matter to the attention of the Joint Select Committee of the Legislature.

The part of the resolution to which I desire particularly to draw the attention of citizens is as follows:—"That the Ratepayers of the City of St. John's be asked to decide by ballot at the same time as they elect their Mayor and Councillors in June of this year whether in future each Councillor should be elected by one of the six wards into which the City may from time to time be divided or that all six Councillors should be elected by the City at large."
