"Let's not go," said the author's wife. "There will be a tremendous crowd."

We had been speaking of the advisability of going into the city, to be present at a celebration the identity of which you may suspect. "That's why I want to go," said Molly, the little photographer-lady. "I love crowds."

And with heart and voice I said, "Me, too."

Ever since I was a child I have been held back from this or that by people who said, "Let's not go, there will be an awful crowd." Nevertheless (or is it consequently?) ever since childhood I have loved crowds.

Not awful, suffocating masses that get wedged in somewhere and can't move either way (though I don't mind these as much as most people do—if you hold on to yourself and don't let yourself get panicky and nervous, and just smile at your neighbor and make a joke of the thing, it's all right), but good-sized, jolly, extensible, irresponsible crowds—election-day crowds, football-game crowds, trade-fairing crowds.

It has long been my theory that some great artist should paint the gigantic crowd at some big football game, say, for instance, the Harvard and Yale. I cannot imagine anything more typically American than that crowd—its bigness, its rollicking youthfulness, its intense interest in the sport, the unreckoning expenditure of time and miles and money, that the gathering represents.

Paul had gone to Ephesus, preaching the Christian gospel, and saying that, "There be no gods which are made with hands." Modern Methods Demand Trained Teachers.

S. J. H. Taking two of the three essentials of an Elementary education I will try to point out why training is necessary to the teachers.

First of all take the subject of Reading. Visit our elementary schools to-day and you find the same state of things that has existed for the last centuries (i.e., generally speaking). Of course, there are exceptions. Children of 5 and 6 years of age have to commit to memory the 26 letters of the alphabet and from that they grind through the primer practically letter by letter, and so on through the next Reader. The child hates reading, hates school, hates books, and often even much trouble to the teacher "that could have been avoided."

Thank goodness there are a few teachers who have adopted the modern system of teaching Reading. The modern system might be called the Word and Sentence method aided by dramatization, etc. My experience of this method is very little but that experience convinced me of its feasibility and also its improvement on the old system. The interest awakened in the children by this method of teaching and the rapidity and intelligence with which it could be taught are alone sufficient to demand Trained Teachers.

The art of Reading intelligently and quickly is well worthy of a training course. And then again take the subject of Arithmetic. How often do we find our pupils able to work a sum by looking at the book example, but powerless to reason for what is behind the wherefore of their calculations. Go further, take away the book and they are ignorant for the first step. These things must have been noticed by the various Superintendents in their annual visits to the schools.

These two subjects are of paramount importance to every one of our children, and we are simply handicapping them by our present out of date methods. This matter of Trained Teachers should engage the attention of every man in the country. Our teachers are suffering from this lack of training. Our workers of to-day are suffering from want of it. And our children, what of them? Are they too to suffer. Some plan should be inaugurated immediately, and our teachers fully equipped for the mighty task before them, of shaping the child's mind and our future destiny.
