Cod Plentiful Along North-West Coast

Straits Still Blocked With Total

(Western Star.) The Ethie found the Straits of elle Isle still blocked with ice, and that ship was unable to get beyond Flower's Cove on her last trip. She eached Curling at 9.30 Monday vening inward bound, when we obained the following report:

Heavy ice from Point forthward, with the Straits ed. The first open water at Flowar's Cove on Sunday. Passengers and mails were landed at Flower's love on Sunday, the ship could not get in the Harbor on acount of ice. Some lobsters at Bartlett's Hr. At Port au Choix there is not much codfishing yet. At Port Saunders there s good fishing and at River of Ponds one trap had 40 quintals. At Bonne Bay and Trout River there is good codfishing. At the latter place on Monday trapmen had moe fish than they could handle. About twenty-five passengers came by the Ethie. She sails north again this afternoon.

A German Naval Disaster.

On May 31, 1878, the battleship Grosser Kurfurst" was rammed by the "Konig Wilhelm" off Folkstone; and sank with the loss of over three hundred lives. The "Kurfurst" was steaming down the channel with the Wilhelm" following close-too close behind her, when a perky little Nerwegian barque came sailing right across her bows. As in duty bound the great ironclad swung round to avoid running the cockleshell in front of her, but as she turned as upon a pivot, she exposed her broadside to her consort, which was steaming at full speed only half a cable's length (one hundred yards) in the rear. The crash of the collision was distinctly heard at Folkestone, nearly three miles away, and many thousands of spectators on the front saw with horror the menster ship reel and isappear beneath the waves, carrying the bulk of her officers and crew with her. By a curious coincidence, one of the finest of our early ronclads, the "Vanguard," was lost in a piecisely similar manner three years previously, being rammed by her censort, the "Iron Duke," off the Wicklow coast while trying to avoid sailing ship that was crossing her bows. Luckily, however she kept float for nearly an hour after th collision, and no lives were lost

One of the simplifications proposed by the latest list of simplified spellings is the elimination from usage of the big word "advertisement" and the substitution therefor of the little word "ad"; and in this case one may believe that the change will not be difficult to bring about. As Addison remarked also, "a man that is by no means big enough for the gazette, may easily creep into the ads," although nowadays one would hardly say that creeping described the invariable manner of entrance.-Christian Science Monitor.

Squealing. (Daily Mail.)

The Huns, as we foresaw, are fillng the air with alamentations and threats that they will call in the Bolsheviks and make common cause with Russia. These threats may well leave the Allies perfectly cold. - Herr Scheidemann, the German Premier, in the speech which we report to-day, admits that Germany cannot adopt an "heroic attitude." This suggests that he will ultimately sign the treaty after the usual Teutonic squeals and protests and after making desperate efforts to entangle the Peace Conference in "oral discussion" of the terms. We can only hope that the "Big Four" will meet these efforts with far greater firmness than they showed in dealng with the arrogant impertinences
