Artificial Fertilizer.

Farmers will be glad to learn that

there will be some reductions in the price of artificial fertilizers this year. Nitrate of Soda, which is most widely used, will be about \$10 per ton cheap er. Superphosphate shows a reduc tion of \$17. A new fertilizer, Slag Phosphate, which is said to have given wonderful results in England, will likely be introduced. This manure is composed of slag and material from the Oceanic Islands in the Pacific, which is largely phosphate. The man-ure will sell for about \$35 per ton.
