Had the Government herrings in the American market. The Alaska fish though unable to compete with ours in size and quality, has the advantage of the new United States tariff, to the amount of \$2.50 a barrel, while the recent reduction in freight from Seattle to New York now makes it about equal as from here. One American firm with a plant in Bay of Islands and another in Green Bay announces that it does not intend engaging in operations in Newfoundland this season, and offers as a reason, that the American market outlook does not warrant it, owing to large stocks now held unsold. It looks as though a big effort is being made by United States interests to establish that country's Pacific fisheries and trade within itself, and supply its markets from its own sources. We have been informed however, that some schooners will be here from Gloucester for salt bulk herring, and that four vessels are now being fitted for that purpose. These fish going in United States bottoms will not be subject to the new tariff duty but will be entered as products of that country's fisheries. So far as our fishermen are concerned, many of them would as soon see a large number of salt-bulkers, for while they may not get so good a price! per barrel for their herring they would no doubt in the aggregate do better in that they would have a certain and ready market for all their

> As it stands at present it is quite apparent the price of herring from the nets will be considerably lower than that of last year and will likely range from \$1.50 to \$2. There has heen some reduction also in freight rates by steamer from here to Halifax, all of which should help materially in an open market.
