It was lying across the road. The feet were acing towards town. Witness picked up a card case, (card case put in vidence) but did not remember what ie did with it until passing it over to spector General Hutchings. After finding that King was dead witness back to Donovan's and subsequently to the Reid car. The first one he saw was Paterson then Reid. The latter was on the town side of the car. Wm. John Long examined by Mr. Hunt. Witness was at the dinner party at Donovans. Witness first knew of the accident when someone came in to the hotel and said a man was killed. He ran down and noticed the bus. It was standing near the second telegraph pole with tail lights on. He saw King's body lying about 30 feet in front of the bus.
Witness then went across the road and met Clift Patterson whom he took Donovan's Hotel. He then went back to the Reid car which as lying in a swamp, head towards Doncvan's. ine car was further towards town than King's body. It was off the edge of the road about 5 feet. At first after the accident there was much ex-citement. Witness saw the members of the Reid party, Mr. Reid appeared

received a message at twenty minutes past twelve on the morning of the accident saying that there was an accident out at Donovans and that two men had been killed. He proceeded there in his car with the superintendant and a couple of constables. He arrived on the scene at 12.40. First on arrival he saw the bus near Powers house, coming toward town. Mr. Grace jumped out of the bus and directed the Inspector General to where the body of Clinton Duder and Burrows lay. There was a crowd around and he asked what happened. Lt. Sleator came up and said he could tell. Sleator shouted to Reid, who came on the scene. He was questioned by the I. G. and said he 66 and 72 inch, each . . . . \$3.50 was coming out the road and saw a red light which he took to be the tail light of a car. He hauled out and saw in front some men, and in trying to escape them he went over the bank. He thought that Reid had some liquor in. The witness went and viewed the body of O'Callagan Next he saw Harrisons, then Whitty's and following this he was shown the body of Lt. King. The latter was lying on the north side of the road with the feet inclined towards the center. Witness made a cross on a fence to mark the location where the body lay. (Plans previously put in evidence were explained to the jury by the witness.) The distance from stump to where King's body was found was 55 feet. From a blood mark to a point opposite the stump was 50 feet. The spot where Whitty's body was found was 66 feet from the stump and welve feet from a motor car track (when it left the road) on the south side of the road, and 19 feet from a tree that had been barked by the car. The stumps were on the gulley side The stumps were on the guney sale of the road, and twelve feet from them there was a road leading towards the station. The car had been uprighted when witness saw it. He was present when Whitty's bank book was picked up by Mr. Murphy. It was picked up in a car track about 12 interest the stump. Two motor tracks were seen running from the stumps towards Topsail, distance about 107 feet. From stumps towards town for a distance of 24 feet there was not a sign of a track. For the next 24 feet or so a track showed unnext 24 feet or so a track showed until it disappeared over the embankment. The marks west of the stump appeared to get thicker as it approached the stump. The track found near the east side of the stump was made by the right wheel of the car. Witness examined the opposite side of the road and saw the marks of the bus wheels. The impression of the inside wheels were three feet in from the edge of the grass. They were from Donovan's gate to the second pole and further. From the first to the second pole there was a distance of 77 feat, Witness saw some blood
