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SIR WILFRID LAURIER SAYS HE WILL NOT
OUTLINE NAVAL POLICY

Meeting Will be More in the Nature of a Party Reunion and Jollification of Loyal Liberals

OTTAWA, Sept. 5.—In the course of conversation with representatives of the press today, Sir Wilfrid Laurier intimated that he does not propose to make a lengthy or particularly important speech at Mariaville in Kootenay county on Saturday. He said that the gathering would be more in the nature of a party reunion and jollification only. It is understood that Sir Wilfrid does not propose to deal at any of his meetings with the naval question in more than a general

way, as he considers it not desirable to do so until such a time as the government has made known its policy. The decisions of both Premier Borden and Sir Wilfrid do not deal specifically with the naval question in their early speeches means that it is not likely to become a subject of much platform oratory for several weeks.

The opposition leader has decided to hold his first Ontario meeting in Northern Ontario in the latter part of September.

IMMIGRANTS ARE COMING INTO CANADA AT
THE RATE OF 50,000 PER MONTH

From April Until August 209,642 New Settlers Came; 143,000 From Ocean Ports and 65,000 From States

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 5.—During the four months from April last to August first of the current fiscal year, 209,642 immigrants arrived in Canada. Of this number 143,742 arrived at Ocean ports and 65,900 from the United States. These figures show an increase of 15 per cent, as compared with those of the corresponding months of last

fiscal year, which were 127,925 at ocean ports and 54,814 from the United States, making a total for the four months April to August, 1911, of 182,739 persons. During the month of July this year there were 54,929 immigrants, 21,739 of them having been at ocean ports, and 33,190 from the United States, as against 39,431 for July last year.

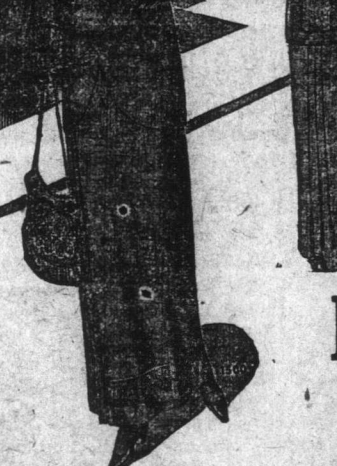
