Egypt's Crop of Cotton

suppress slavery in Turkey. surprised to see how little Cairo, Egyp, pril 18.—It is estimated that 90 percent of the 1912-1913 cotton crop has now reached Alexandria, and it is posible to determine the quantity and value of the crop with a fair degree of accuracy. By the end of February the average proportion of the crop which has arrived at Alexandria has, duing the past 17 years, been 85 percent. In one year only, 1910, when the crop was very bad, has the percentage exceeded 90. Thus, the field for mistakes in estimating is very limited, and the figures put forward by the agricultural and statistical departments of the government may be accepted as practically correct. They
