Mrs. Gilbert Wright, who died at Aylmer
on Sunday, August 30th, was one of the old-
est residents of the county of Elgin. Born in
1828, she was the second daughter of the late
Neil McKinnon, of "Kilmirec," Isle of Skye,
who came to Canada in 1837. In his earlier
years he had had plantations in Demerara and
had retired to live in Scotland, but, meeting
with losses, through endorsing for a friend, he
came to Canada comparatively late in life and
settled at Vienna, which was then regarded as
one of the most promising places in Canada
West. There he carried on business to the
time of his death. It is a curious fact that
interesting papers relating to his Demerara
property, including lists of his 700 slaves,
their prices, ages, &c., were left in a box in
an old warehouse at Port Burwell. A member
of the family went to enquire about them
during the past year and found that they had
been destroyed as rubbish only a short time
before by the present owner of the building.

Mrs. Wright, though born in Scotland, spent
the greater part of her life at Vienna. Indians
were numerous in this neighborhood not so
long ago, and she remembered seeing as many
as five at a time spending the night lying on
the floor before the kitchen fire in her father's
house. One frequent visitor was "Shoemaker
Snake," who had been with Tecumseh. Since
1877 the family life has now come to an end.
Her husband survives her and she leaves one
daughter, Mrs. W. J. Johnston, of Duluth,
Minn., and three sons, Mr. J. M. Wright, of
Aylmer, Professor Wright, of the University
of Toronto, and W. G. Wright, of Duluth.
