THROUGH MANITOBA.

What Mr. F. W. Hodson Saw in Six

Some Heavy and Light Creps-Beautiful District Around Carberry-Drawbacks and Advantages of the Country-Mr. Hodson's Deductions.

Mr. Frederick W. Hodson, of this city, editor of the Farmers' Advocate, has just returned from a six weeks' tour of the Northwest. The trip was taken partly through business, but principally to learn more of the country and the progress being made by the settlers, An ADVERTISER reporter called on Mr. Hodson to get his opinion of the west. He was greatly pleased with the result of his trip, and exexpressed himself in part as follows:

"Immediately upon arriving I secured a team and camping outfit, and drove about 400 or 500 miles through the country, takin all the principal agricultural districts between Winnipeg and Brandon, going to Brandon through the district north of the C. P. R., and returning by the road south region in the Northwest is the Red River Valley, which includes land immediately surrounding Winnipeg. Among eastern people, and in fact among the people of Manitoba, it is generally believed that the land around Winnipeg is not good-first, because little of it is farmed, secondly because that which is farmed as a rule produces poor crops. The reason for the first condition is that the land is largely held by speculators, who ask a larger price than in-See our Heavy Home Made Flannel, tending settlers will pay, but the chief reason is that that portion which is farmed is principally in the hands of old Selkirk settlers and descendants, or is owned by Metis and breeds, all of whom are bad farmers, and are a detriment to the country in every particular. Historic Kildonan is one of the finest parishes in the Northwest, but is so poorly farmed that it has received a bad name, which the land does not deserve. One reason why the land is not settled is because it is nearly all divided in long narrow farms, some of which will not be more than from four to six rods wide and from two to four miles long. No eastern man in his senses will buy a farm of such a

"Proceeding east from Winnipeg north of the track the crops are from fair to good where the land is well farmed. About Rosser the oat crop is particularly good. Spring wheat is all harvested and threshed, and will average about fifteen bushels per acre. No. 1 hard. Westward from Rosser, through Poplar Point, on the Portage Plains, the crops gradually increase. Throughout the plains they are very good. Wheat will probably average 20 bushels to the acre and oats from 40 to 60. Leaving Portage Plains and continuing west for some distance the land is not so productive. Crops vary according to the condition of the soil. At Carberry and throughout the Carberry Plains and northward through the beautiful plains the crops are excellent. Wheat is very fine and oats exceedingly good. We saw sevtions of America I have never seen such yields of oats as those around Carberry.

"Leaving the fertile lands, we passed through a sandier district, which continued until near Brandon. In fact, much of the land around Brandon has a lighter subsoil than that at Carberry, Portage la Prairie or Winnipeg. About Brandon the wheat crop is lighter than in some of the other districts, and will probably average about fifteen bushels per acre.

"From Brandon we went southward and traversed the section of the country south of the track, visiting Wawansea, Carman, Manitou, Morden and other important wheat sections. Judging the country from this year's crops and present indications, Southern Manitoba is the most desirable section of the Province. The crops were universally heavier and much cleaner, and generally the homes of the people were more inviting. At Wawansea, Thornhill and adjoining districts many very heavy fields of wheat were seen, some of which would average from 40 to 50 bushels per acre. All through Red River valley and as far west as Austin on the main line to the north of the track, Canada thistles are more or less plentiful. Throughout Winnipeg district they fairly own the country. French weed, known sometimes as stink weed, is thick on the land owned by the half-breeds and Selkirk settlers. Wild oats are also very plentiful and were found as far west as Portage Plains. In Southern Manitoba weeds are less plentiful. Here and there along the line of the Northern Pacific were to be seen a few wild oats. The Russian thistle, to extirminate which the American authorities propose spending several millions of dollars, has made its appearance, and the Department of Agriculture at Winnipeg is leaving no stone unturned in its efforts to kill this plant where it exists in Manitoba."

Mr. Hodson had gone on a similar trip six years ago. This time he noticed a very marked improvement. The homes of the settlers, as a rule, were better, the appearance of the farms and steadings more inviting; altogether an air of prosperity pervades many of the settlements. Fine substantial farm houses were to be seen in every direction, and not a few good outbuildings. Without a doubt where men have settled in Manitoba with the determination to make it their home, and have not overreached themselves, they have done exceedingly well. The average wheat yield this year was estimated at sixteen bushels per acre. This, of course, includes the large acreage put in by men who know little or nothing about farming, also a large acreage put in by men who try to accomplish far too much work with insufficent help, and an acreage put in by the breeds and old Selkirk settlers, who as above list are requested to send in they work too poorly to expect an average crop. Where the land was well and intelligently farmed the probable average wheat yield would reach about twenty bushels. Some farms ranged as high as 35 bushels.

difficulty is experienced in getting water. This is being overcome by the Government, who have purchased some well-drilling machinery and prepose to send out men to drill wells for settlers where needed. In most sections water can be found at a moderate depth. Ever since the establishment of the experimental farm (and by some of the settlers for years before) attempts have been made to grow apples. As yet these efforts have been unsuccessful, and, in my opinion, always will be so. I do not think that apples can be generally grown-in fact, I do not believe they will be grown at

"I suppose the country has its advantages?" asked the reporter. "Very many," was the answer. "A man can settle in Manitoba and either establish a business or purchase and farm land with far less capital than he could in Eastern Canada. If the men who do go there would be satisfied with acquiring a good home and plenty of food and clothing and the possibility of giving their children a chance in life, Manitoba will satisfy them. School and church privileges are as good there as

"How is the population?" "Gradually increasing," said Mr. Hodson. "The Province may be losing a lot of its spoculators, but none of its good men and women. There were a class who went of the track. Probably the best farming there with the expectation of picking up dollars without earning them. They have found their mistake and those who do not believe in working are leaving the country, while the balance are being converted into good citizens. Conversion is no easy mattea."
