> PROVED. London, March 10.-The House of Commons last night resumed the discussion of the naval estimates on the vote for more men. John Dillon, the leader of the Anti-Parnellites, and William Redmond both contended that the naval proposals were intended as a merace to the United States, and for that reason every Irishman would oppose them. Right Hon. G. J. Goschen, First Lord of the Admiralty, declared that the suggestion was absurd. Mr. Dillon, he added, seemed desirous of creating in the United States ani-mosity towards Great Britain, of which, happily, there was no indication in the American newspapers. Continuing, Mr. Goschen said that the naval programme was settled in November last, before any of the events that had caused the recent anxiety had occurred, and were deliberately framed upon the policy that had long been pursued. It was not intended to attack anybody, unless Great Britain was first attacked. The Government entertained no idea of an adventurous course anywhere on the globe. It merely desired to be prepared for possible eventualities. Walter Hazell, (Advanced Liberal), the member for Leicester, and treasurer of the Peace Society, asked the Government to make a pronouncement in favor of international arbitration Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Treasury, and Govern-ment leader in the House, said that nobody would be more pleased than rimself to see international arbitratien established, and steps thereto would be taken. The vote was carried by a majority of 216, the division showing 261 members in favor of it to 45 against.

'FRISCO PAINTERS STRIKE.

San Francisco, March 10.-Eight hundred painters are out on strike. They want an increase of 50 cents a day, making their wages \$3 instead of 50. A general strike among the building trades is feared, as plasterers, carpenters and plumbers are said to be in sympathy with the painters.

Strained Relations Between the Presi dent and the Secretary of State.

Buffalo, N. Y., March 10.—A special to the Evening News from Washington says the rumor of strained relations between President Cleveland and Secretary Olney is again renewed. This time the basis for the report seems to be more substantial. President Cleveland has authorized an emphatic disclaiment of the Wolfer of the Ka

The President assumes to believe that the statement published is a newspaper guess. Yet, he must know that it was inspired, even if not absolutely dictated by his Secretary of State. Mr. Olney is reticent, but his friends assert that he is exceedingly angry at the palpable slap which he has received. They add that nothing but the fear of entangling the foreign situation more seriously keeps him from tendering his resignation at once. Even as it is, no great surprise would be created by the announcement that the Secretary of State has decided to sever his connection with the Administration.

DIED AFTER A BLOW. A Sensation in Norfolk—Mrs. Honberger's Death the Cause of a Coroner's Inquest at Middleton - What

the Evidence Shows. Simcoe, March 10.-Coroner Stanton, of this town, was suddenly called to Middleton, a place about 30 miles from here, to hold an inquest on the body of Mrs. Phoebe Honsberger, who had died there very suddenly after a blow, it was alleged, inflicted by her hus-

band, with whom she had a quarrel. Alfred Honsberger and his wife were married about thirteen years ago, but their married life was never of the happiest. They worried along, however, until last July, when they separated. After a week or two of living apart, they reunited. They quarreled frequently, and on the day of the woman's death they had a severe quarrel in the morning, which ended by the man striking his wife across the face with the back of his hand, causing the blood to flow freely. She retired to another room for a time, but soon came out, and was rocking the baby as the man left the house to go to

work. In a few hours Mrs. Honsberger sent her boy to a neighbor's for assistance, saying she was choking. The woman came and sent for another neighbor and the husband, but despite all they could do, Mrs. Honsberger died. Then a doctor was notified (Dr. Reid, of Tilsonburg), and as there was a great deal of talk about foul play in the neighborhood he decided to notify the cor-

At the inquest Dr. Reid testified that he thought the cause of death was syncope, but the jury insisted on having a post mortem examination. This was done, and the result confirmed the doctor's opinion, as the heart found to be badly diseased, and there also was an abscess on the right kidney. These causes, aided by the excitement of the morning's quarrel, caused the death. The jury brought in quarrel a verdict to that effect.

HIS SHORTAGE, \$1,620,000.

Tacoma, Wash., March 10.-The investigation of the books of Paul Schulze, for years a trusted official of the Northern Pacific Railway, and who a year ago committed suicide on the eve of the exposure, has just been completed. Portland, Ore., March 10.-A huge landslide swept down a ravine on Portland Heights at 7 o'clock yesterday morning, cor pletely wrecking the dwelling house of Daniel McDonald, killing his daughter Belle, aged 18, and his cousin, Daniel Campbell, who was a guest in the house, and seriously injuring McDonald and his wife and a younger daughter Mary. FINGER TORN OUT.

Brantford, March 10 .- An exceedingly painful accident took place at the Prantford carriage works yesterday morning. One of the employes named George Miller, residing on Terrace Hill, was working around a planer while in motion, when the machine caught the second finger of his hand and was drawing in the whole hand when a fellow-workman ran forward and grasped him. But for timely aid he would assuredly have been drawn into the machine and killed. As it is, the finger was pulled out of the hand and destroyed.
