Terrible Accident on the St. Lawrence
—Six Young Men Drowned.

MONTREAL, July 2.—There was a fright ful boating accident on the St. Lawrence in sight of this city this afternoon, by which six lives were lost. Seventeen nembers of the Grand Trunk Boating Clubrowed over during the atternoon from their boat house to St. Heien's Island in a long war cance over 30 feet in length. The boat reached the island in safety. On the way back, when opposite St. Lambert's, the bragile cance got caught by the current and capsized. Those drowned are: Thomas O'Brieu aged 23, Howard Ransom aged 22, Ernest Lee aged 20, Edwin Sleep aged 24, J. Mulligan aged 23, and another young man whose name has not yet been reported. All the young men lived with their families at Point St. Charles. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

Two MORE FATALITIES.

Two other young men who went out boating this morning at Naus Island, near the scene of yesterday's accident, were upset and drowned. Their names were not reported to the police.
