parents in Muskoka. P. C. Walter Smith
and Westman are now enjoying themselves
off duty.

—John Mann & Son's advertisement

—On retiring from active labor with
the intention of spending the winter in Spo-
kane Falls, Wash., Mr. Samuel Genge was
on Monday presented by the workmen of
Ferguson's furniture establishment with a
pair of fine gold spectacles and an address
expressing in kind terms the esteem in
which he is held by those with whom he
had worked for many years. Mr. Genge
was employed at Ferguson's for more than
21 years. He and his wife left last evening
for Spokane, where their three sons are
established and doing well.

Gable, the Much-Married.
Ezra Gable was arrested in Detroit
Saturday afternoon by Detective Tuttle on
a charge of bigamy. It appears that Gable,
who has a wife in Essex, married a young
woman named Susan Brand about three
months ago. Getting tired of wife No. 2
he went to Detroit and became engaged to
a woman named Sawyer, living on Hastings
street, and was to have been married
again yesterday. After being arrested
Gable agreed to go to Windsor and stand
his trial. The London wife is expected,
and the case will be heard to-day in
Windsor.

Tuesday's Police Court.

a week on a charge of attempted suicide.

Carriage Rates to be Charged by the
Mr. E. N. King, G. T. R. freight agent,
has issued the following circular: "Grand
Trunk Railway freight agent's office, Lon-
don, Nov. 12, 1905. Please advise me of
the 14th inst. all rates in effect
at this station will be subject to an ad-
ditional charge at either or both ends for
cartage of 1 1/2 cents per 100 pounds on
freight classified as first to fourth and 1c
per 100 pounds on fifth class freight."

Resignation of Prof. Saunders.
An Ottawa dispatch of Saturday's date
says: It was rumored to-day that Prof.
Saunders had handed in his resignation as
the Dominion Government's World's Fair
Commissioner. The Minister of Agricul-
ture says the resignation has not been re-
ceived, though Prof. Saunders complains
that his health is not at all satisfactory. It
is asserted that the professor is anxious
that he be allowed to give up the duties
connected with the World's Fair, as he
feels it too great a strain to attend to
them in addition to his oversight of the
Experimental Farm.

At the regular communication of Union
Lodge, No. 881, A. F. & A. M., G. C. C.,
held last night, Wor. Master Bro. W. G.
McMillan took a new departure from the
usual custom, and filled the different offices
with his past masters. The following wor-
shipful brethren filled the respective offices:

O. J. Bridle, J. W.; Wor. Bro. H. Strat-
ford, J. D.; Wor. Bro. Norton, S. D. The
first and second degrees were exemplified
in a creditable manner. Among those who
sat in the stand were Very Wor. Bro.
J. D. Clarke, Wor. Bro. A. A. Campbell,
J. H. Stead, G. M. Francis (Belmont),
A. G. McWhinney and W. W. Fitzgerald.
There were also present from a distance
Wor. Bro. J. H. Adams, of Calgary, and
Wor. Bro. G. J. Scott, of Ottawa. After the
work had been performed the worshipful
master invited the brethren to the library,
where light refreshments were partaken of
and a pleasant hour spent in speech-making
and singing.

Another Big Convention.
The executive committee of the Western
Ontario Dairywomen's Association met in the
Tucumseh House yesterday afternoon.
Among those present were Messrs. J.
Geary (president); Hon. Thos. Ballantyne,
M.P.P.; A. J. McLaren, Stratford; J.
S. Pearce, clerk; C. E. Chawich,
ex-secretary of the association, Inger-
goll, and J. W. Wheaton, the pres-
ent secretary. The object of the meet-
ing was to make arrangements for the com-
ing convention of the Western Ontario
Dairywomen's Association, which it was de-
cided should be held here on Jan. 10, 11
and 12. Among the speakers expected are
Hon. John Dryden, Hon. Thomas Bal-
lantyne, Hon. John Carling; ex-Governor
Hoar, of Wisconsin; Prof. Robertson,
Dominion Commissioner, Ottawa; Prof.
Fletcher, of the Experimental Farm at
Ottawa; Prof. Deas, of the Ontario Agri-

cultural College, Guelph; C. C. James,
Deputy Minister of Agriculture for On-
tario; D. M. McPherson and others. Ar-
rangements were also made for the estab-
lishment here of an office for the head-
quarters of the association.

Independent Order of Foresters.
Dr. Oronhyatekha, supreme chief ranger,
accompanied by Mr. John A. McGillivray,
supreme secretary, and Dr. Millman,
supreme physician, left Toronto yesterday
for Washington, D. C., to attend the
annual convention of the Fraternal Congress
of the United States, which convenes in
that city this week, and before which Dr.
Oronhyatekha will read a paper on
"Fraternal Benefit Society Insurance."

The S. C. R. received a cable on Sat-
urday that all the preliminaries required
preceding the deposit of the \$100,000
with the British Government had been
satisfactorily arranged and the securi-
ties paid, thus placing the I. O. F. in a
position to prosecute their work with suc-
cess in Europe. For the first ten days of
this month there have been received 580
applications for membership, of which 40
were rejected. During the past few days
the following new courts have been in-
stituted: Court Dromore, No. 1,180, at
Dromore, Ont.; Merlin, No. 1,181, at
Merlin, Ont.; Paisley, No. 1,183, at
Paisley, Ont.; Charlemagne, No. 1,187, at
St. Roch, Quebec; Union City, No. 1,188,
at Union City, Ind.; Matane, No. 1,190, at
Matane, Quebec; and Menominee, No.
1,191, at Menominee, Mich. These lodges
start with an average charter list of 19
members each.

DISSENTERS SEEK REUNION.

The Members Who Withdrew From the
Western Ontario Bible Society Will

Be Welcomed Back.
At the last bi-monthly meeting of the
Western Ontario Bible Society, held in the
Y. M. C. A. hall, Dr. Sanderson in the
chair, a communication was read by Rev.
J. H. Orme from the gentlemen who with-
drew from the society some months ago,
seeking reunion on certain conditions. The
sentiment of the board was voiced in the
following resolution: Moved by Rev. Dr.
Antill, seconded by H. E. Nelles, and
resolved: "That this board expresses its
sorrow at the receipt of a communication
from the brethren who recently withdrew
from the Western Ontario Bible Society
expressing a desire for reunion; and this
board hereby expresses its willingness to
accept the principle set forth in their
resolution; and further, that a committee
of five be appointed to confer with the
brethren represented by the letter to con-
sider details and report to a future meeting
of this board." A committee of five was
nominated and elected.

The general secretary read a communi-
cation from Rev. Major Paul, of the
parent society, acknowledging the receipt
of the handsome remittance of \$1,257 and
\$800 on purchase account, also referring to
the deficit of the British and Foreign Bible
Society of \$27,000, caused by increasing
demands made upon the committee,
especially by the foreign missionary
societies during the past four years. He
asked for special contributions in behalf
thereof, and it was agreed that a special
effort be made to aid the home committee
in their hour of need.

The report from the depository re the
society's exhibit at the Western Fair was
deemed highly satisfactory, as was also the
sales for recent months, including the
last month, they being in advance of the
corresponding months of last year.

SAFE IN PORT.

Arrival of the Long Overdue Steamer
England at New York.

New York, Nov. 14.—The steamship
England, of the National Line, long since
due at this port from London, arrived to-
day.

On Oct. 29 when she was thirteen days
out her machinery broke down. The
engineers finally managed to make tempo-
rary repairs so that the ship could proceed
cautiously under a slow head of steam.

Committed Suicide Over His Sweet- heart's Body.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Nov. 12.—William
Walters and Miss Emily Davis, two
esteemed young people of Olyphant, were
engaged to be married. Miss Davis died
on Thursday. Walters was much grieved,
and next night he called to see the body of
his sweetheart. When in the room he took
a glass of water, put strychnine in it, and
then looking upon the dead girl said:
"Emily, I'll soon be with you." In ten
minutes he was dead.
