DISASTER ON SPANISH RIVER,

By Which 33 Men Are Said To Have Perished.

Ottawa, May 29.—An evening paper publishes the following dispatch, which so far cannot be confirmed. News reached the city today of a terrible accident on the Spanish River, by which 33 men lost their lives.

They were in the employ of Messrs. Davidson and Hayes, and were asleep at the time of the awful catastrophe. These facts were elicited from a gentleman who arrived down from the vicinity today.

The accident occurred on Wednesday last. It seems from the meager details to hand that the men were encamped on a crib of square timber for the night. It was moored near the head of a rapids, and broke from its moorings to the waters below. So far as known the men belonged to Ottawa.

The act was not resented, the boys had no more to say and the Chinaman walked back into the store and proceeded to business.

THE W. C. T. U.

"The Children of Our City" was the educational subject discussed at the regular semi-monthly meeting Tuesday afternoon, and, as would naturally be expected in a meeting so largely composed of mothers, the subject was well handled.

Mrs. Tennant read a practical paper on "The Need of Temperance Training in the Home." This was followed by Mrs. D. H. Williams, on "Methods of Temperance Training," and a most interesting discussion ensued.

Mrs. D. A. McDermid then took up the subject of "Purity Among Children," a subject that requires more strict attention than it has ever had in the past.

Several ladies gave texts of scripture that had proved specially helpful to them in the training of their children.

It was decided to open a band of hope in East London, under the direction of the evangelistic committee.

TWO SIDES TO A STORY.

The Toronto News has stated that disintegration exists in the Salvation Army in that city and throughout the Province, and cites in proof desertions of officers within the last few months. It gives the list of those who left as Captains Phillipot, Bolton, McHardy, Beatty, Hall, Markle, Brigadier de Barritt, ex-Commissioner Adams, Lieut. Hunt and F. W. Fry, Commandant Booth's private secretary. It further states that the tyranny of Commandant Booth is the reason of the alleged disintegration. The army has not disintegrated to any extent in London, if it has anywhere else. Instead it has gone ahead, and continues to grow rapidly. An officer attached to headquarters here states as a proof of the untrustworthiness of the rumor that only four of the alleged desertions took place within the last few months—Markle, De Barritt, Adams and Fry. Some of the others left as long ago as three years and three years and a half. There are always a number coming and going in every organization, and a fair comparison would be to compile a list of officers who have taken up the work during the time the others let it drop.
