WEEKLY REVIEW.

Wheat shows a loss during the past week. Receipts continue light, and the demand steady. The low prices of flour abroad and in the provinces is given as the reason for the decline. At today's session \$1.05 to \$1.10 were the ruling prices.

There was an extra good demand for oats among the commission buyers, and the supply being somewhat light, higher values resulted. The advance for the week is about 5c, with 9c to 9 1/2c as closing figures.

Peas were very scarce, not over 200 bu being marketed all week. The range of prices was from \$1 to \$1.15.

No corn, rye or buckwheat offered.

Barley—Sales were few, very little being offered; 80c was the bottom, and 92c the top price; demand quiet.

Beans—During the first few days of the week quite a few small lots came in. The usual price paid was \$1.25 to \$1.35. The \$1 quotation in the column is for poor and dirty stock only.

Clover seed—Only an occasional transaction took place on the open market, though several private deals were made. About \$3.50 to \$3.75 was the value of red, and \$3 to \$3.50 for alsike.

The increased value of both dressed and live hogs has made little difference in the receipts; \$5.35 was the closing price of live, and \$5.75 to \$7 for dressed.

Hay—Receipts were good. Sales for the week ranged from \$3.50 to \$9.50, according to quality.

Straw was quiet, at \$3 by the load, and \$6 per ton.

American Markets.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 20.—A bulge of 50c in the price of May pork, the result of a small panic among shorts in that article, was the feature of trading on 'Change today. The advance was due to fear of a corner.

May pork closed 2 1/2c lower; lard and ribs, 3c to 7 1/2c lower. Wheat was dull, but fairly steady, helped by better foreign cables, and closed a shade lower. Chicago receipts were 64 cars.

Minneapolis and Duluth receipts were 716 cars, compared with 923 cars last week and 323 a year ago. Total primary receipts were 511,000 bushels.

Clearances from Atlantic and Gulf ports amounted to 414,000 bushels. The seaboard reported 30 loads taken for export, while 170,000 bushels were sold here for shipment. Chicago contract stocks decreased 94,000 bushels for the week.

PARLIAMENT

Dr. Russell's Preferential Trade Amendment Carried by 45 Majority.

Ottawa, March 20.—At 1 o'clock this morning the vote was taken upon Mr. Russell's amendment to the motion to go into supply, declaring that: "This House regards the principle of British preference in the Canadian customs tariff as one which in the application has already resulted, and will in the increasing measure continue to result, in material benefit to the mother country and to Canada, and which has already aided in welding and strengthening the bond between the two countries, and desires to express its emphatic approval of such British preference having been granted by the Parliament of Canada." The majority for the amendment was 45, Mr. Bourassa (Liberal) voting with the
