"NO MALICE"

Verdict of the Jury in the Toronto Shooting Case-Effect of Dime Novel Reading.

Toronto, May 12 .- According to the erdict of the jury, which was returned last night, there was no malice in the mind of Arthur McIntyre when he shot and killed his father on Thursday morning. The members of the jury, after hearing the evidence of twenty witnesses, decided that the boy had no murderous intent, and by a recom-mendation against the sale of bad books to children, showed that in their opinion the reading of detective stories to some extent had affected the boy's
