Advance on Pekin to Be Made as Speedily as Possible.

A German General Selected as Commander of the Allied Forces-Danger of a Massacre of Europeans When the Advance on Pekin Begins-Fighting in the Amur Distriot Between Russians and Chinese-The Christians Plundered.

Shan Tung has telegraphed to United States Consul Fowler that the Tsung Li Yamen directs him to notify the ions at Pekin and Tien Tsin are unsettled," only messages in plain language, without cipher or reference to military affairs, will be delivered to the ministers.

The governor says that the rebels occupy Peo Ting Fu, and Consul Fowler fears that the missionaries there

have been murdered. The allies now confront a difficult and dangerous problem. Without doubt the ministers are held by the Chinese as hostages, and the outcome of the advance on Pekin, which in all probability has already begun, will be awaited with intense anxiety. The latest dispatches show that the allies, notably the Japanese, have been pushing their preparations with feverish haste, organizing a service of pack carts, trains and junks.

UNDER GERMAN COMMANDER. It is reported from Berlin that Lieut .-Gen, Von Lessel, commanding the German forces in China, whom Emperor William has just promoted rank of general commanding an army orps, has been selected as commander-

in-chief of the allied forces. The Chinese are strongly entrenched at Wang Tsun, from which position, however, it is believed they can be ejected without great difficulty.

THE DANGER. The danger is that, if defeated there, the Chinese will retire to Pekin and put the remainder of the Europeans to death. It is also possible that the advance of the allies will be the signal for the Chinese authorities to compel all foreigners to quit the capital, in which event they might become the prey of the fanatical Boxers. feeling of the newspapers here is that nothing whatever should now delay the advance, and that no negotiations of any kind should be countenanced until the allied troops reach Pekin and assure themselves regarding the fate of

### the foreigners. FIGHTING IN AMUR.

Official reports have been received at St. Petersburg that the Chinese again bombarded Blagovestchensk, capital of the Amur Government, on July 26 and 28. The Russian guns replied and reinforcements were then approaching. On July 28 a steamer arrived at Lu Cha Su, towing three boats from Harbin. with 1,500 refugees, including 120 sick and wounded. A Russian force crossed the frontier at Abagitu on July 26. Work on the railway has been resumed there. The Russians have burned some Chinese villages and expelled a Chinse garrison of 2,000 from the fortress at Bajantun, capturing five Krupp guns, which had not yet been mounted, the carriages of four naval guns and a quantity of ammunition.

TO WIPE OUT THE RUSSIANS. The Russian consul at Kuddia sends the following, under date of July 27: The governor of Kuddja received ders from the empress to exterminate the Russians, and the Chinese were preparing to execute the com-mand, but since the arrival of Russian troops for the protection of the consulate matters have been quiet. The Rusisan consul at Kasghar reports an alarming state of affairs, there owing to the excitement among the

Chinese troops TROUBLE IN MANCHURIA. St. Petersburg, July 31.—The Russian general staff has received dispatches from various commanders indicating a serious state of affairs in Manchuria. The revolt in the neighborhood of Mukden and northward has assumed such proportions that the Russian from Mukden southward. At Ajasandzian on July 8 the Russian column was surprised and surrounded by Chinese troops. Reinforcements were sent, and the withdrawal of the column was effected to Daschizao, with 48 casualties. Daschizao has been completely destroyed, and the fate of the workmen and the railway officials north of Mukden is not known. The whole Mukden district is menaced by large bodies of Chinese troops. On July 17 the garrison at Sinjudshi was shelled from the town, three men being killed.

Che Foo, Aug. 1.-The governor of insula was attacked and surrounded by Chinese troops on July 21. The Russians eventually repulsed the Chinese, with a loss of eight Cossacks killed, and ten wounded. Similar reports have been received from other points.

NO BARGAINING. London, July 31.—United States Ambassador Choate saw the prime minister this evening and ascertained his views with regard to the changes in th Chinese situation brought about by the direct dispatches from Pekin. Lord Salisbury assured Mr. Choate that Great Britain had no intention of delaying the advance on Pekin, nor, so far as he knew, had any other power. Lord Salisbury entirely acquiesced in Secretary Hay's desire that the advance be undertaken as speedily as possible. He had no intention of bargaining with China in any way, shape or form, until the ministers were safe under their own military escort. China is making strenuous efforts to come to some agreement with the powers previous to handing over the ministers, but this will not be con-

sidered for a moment. AFTER PEKIN IS REACHED. Once Pekin has been reached and the ministers have regained their liberty, the powers have agreed aggression will cease and reparation will become a matter of negotiation. Salisbury believes it may still be proved that the Chinese government is not responsible for the attacks on the legations, except in so far as all governments are responsible for the maintenance of order. It is expected lished twenty or thirty miles nearer that within a few days free communication will be established with the Pekin, and supplies will be assembled ministers in Pekin.

SAFETY OF THE CONSULS. Important additional confirmation of the safety of the legations was ceived in London last evening by Mr. Duncan Campbell, representative in Europe for the Chinese customs service, from the commissioner of customs at Che Foo, in the shape of a Pekin dispatch, not dated, but be-lieved to have been written on July 21, signed by both Sir Robert Hart, inspector-general of customs, and Mr. Robert Bredon, deputy inspector-general, to the following effect: "Staff and family are safe." general safe 22nd." A Berlin dispatch says: Hope rein Pekin now runs high in Berlin. ## HELD AS HOSTAGES.

A dispatch received at Rome says: "The Chinese government is detaining 600 Europeans as hostages, including the ministers and their families and and the city would be quite unable to members of the legations." It is believed at Rome that when war is of-ficially declared these will be ordered to leave Pekin within 24 hours.

The commander of the Italian cruiser Elba, at Tien Tsin, received the following telegram today from the Japanese military attache at Pekin, dated July 22: "The legations are eagerly awaiting relief. Cannot hold out long. Sixty Europeans killed."

LOOKING TO LI. The Shanghai correspondent of the Times says the general aspect of the situation confirms the opinion that the Manchu party, fearing the effect of further violent measures, rely on Li Hung Chang's negotiations to prevail upon the powers to forego vengeance in return for the release of the sur-

The Russians had four wounded, and the Chinese six killed and ten wounded.
