BRUCE.

Mr. John George has been appointed by the Port Elgin Council to interview the G. T. R. authorities and urge that the mixed run to the Port daily.

BRANT.

The following commissioners to the General Assembly, to be held in Brantford in June next, were appointed at the late meeting of the Huron Presbytery: Revs. Dr. McDonald, Musgrave, Stewart and Robert Henderson, and the elders of London, Brantford, Kippewick and Hensall, namely, Messrs. J. Scott, T. Lydell, T. Melville and Robert Melville. Rev. Dr. McDonald, of St. Paul's, was nominated as moderator of the General Assembly.

Before an immense audience at the opera house on Friday evening Mrs. Shephard, the ex-nun, was presented with a Bible by Brantford sympathizers. The presentation was made by Rev. Mr. Thompson, a Baptist minister.

ELGIN.

At the First Methodist Church, parsonage, St. Thomas, on Thursday last, Rev. R. J. Trevelyan united in marriage Mr. Chas. Stanton, third son of Mr. Wm. Stanton, Port Stanley, and Miss Samantha McIntyre, eldest daughter of Mr. Duncan McIntyre, Southwold. Miss Bessie Stanton, sister of the groom, attended the bride, and Mr. Row Ferguson waited on the groom.

The Wallace family, from Dunwich, six in number, have been admitted to the Elgin House of Industry. They are as follows: Mrs. Elsie Wallace, the mother, aged 95; Mary, 62; Duncan, 60; Susan, 58; Phoebe, 56; Catherine, 49. None of the sons or daughters have ever been married. The mother, though 95, possesses her faculties unimpaired.

A man named William Gilson, con. 6, lot 21, Dawn, died recently from inflammation. A doctor was sent for and on arriving at the deceased's residence, was surprised to find about a foot of water under his bed, caused by the recent floods. Mr. Gilson was "keeping batch" at the time and it is thought his death was caused by exposure consequent on his surroundings.

St. Thomas Times: "One by one the old landmarks are passing away. On Saturday the death occurred of Mrs. Fannie Oliver, wife of Henry Oliver, River road, Southwold, in her 83rd year. She was a native of Kilbuck, Cornwall, England, and came to Canada in 1841, settling on lot 1, con. 6 of Yarmouth. She was the last surviving member of her family. Besides her husband she leaves but one daughter, the wife of Mr. Henry Joiner.

HURON.

The proprietors of the City of Windsor have taken that vessel out of the fish business and will run her along the Lake Huron shore between Detroit and Bruce peninsula. The present proposal is to call at Port Elgin twice a week during these trips.—[Windsor Echo.]

Roderick McDonald, fisherman, South side, Kincardine, has been presented with a gold medal by the American Government, for heroism displayed in saving the life of Miss Denison, an American lady who was drowning in the Detroit River. Regardless of the darkness and the swift current Mr. McDonald plunged into the river and kept the lady's head above water until assistance arrived.—[Windsor Echo.]

Mrs. George Brewer died at her late residence, con. 4, township of Morris, on Saturday morning, aged 71 years. The deceased was born in Wellington, Somersetshire, England, and was united in marriage on Dec. 25, 1852. They came to St. Thomas in May, 1853, and after a residence of two and a half years, removed to Seaforth, and two and a half years later took up 25 con. 4, from Crown Land Department, and became residents of Morris township, where they have lived continuously since.

THE BIDDULPH AFFRAY.

The Evidence of the Injured Man's Daughter—The Doctor's Story and Other Evidence—Adjudged for a Week.

The Biddulph stabbing case came up for trial before Squire Lacey at the Court House yesterday afternoon. Mr. J. B. McKillop prosecuted and Mr. Edmund Meredith defended the prisoner, Alfred Dignan. The prisoner's wife was present.

James Ryder, the 13-year-old daughter of James Ryder, the wounded man, was the first witness called. She said that she was driving home from Lucan on the evening of March 6, together with her father and her aunt, Mrs. Patton. As they came to Dignan's place on the Roman line the latter on a mure pile and acted improperly. This incensed her father, and, telling her to hold the reins, he jumped out of the sleigh and threw off his overcoat, undercoat, hat and vest. There was then some preliminary name-calling, in which the different religions of both men were mentioned. Dignan wanted Ryder to come inside the gate, but the latter declined, preferring to have the fight out on the road.

After a while Dignan came out, followed by his wife, and, in the words of the little girl, her father "fell on Dignan." When Dignan came out on the road he held his right hand behind him, but the little girl could not say whether he held a knife in it or not. When Dignan got on top of Ryder, Mrs. Dignan encouraged her husband with "Give it to him Alfred," and other words. The little girl tried to pull Dignan off her father, but Mrs. Dignan pushed her back and would not let her. Mrs. Patton was all this while in the sleigh, minding the horses.

Cross-examined by Mr. Meredith—Her father had not been drinking in Lucan that day to her knowledge. Her father's knife was in his pants pocket when he got home. They had not washed it, and when the doctor asked to see it that night she showed it to him. He said: "That knife is not fit to stab any one with. It was only an ordinary kitchen knife with a small blade. Dignan had only desisted striking and cutting her father when the latter cried out 'I am killed.'"

Dr. James Sutton, Chatham, was put in the box. He called, he said, on the night in question to attend to James Ryder, whom he found suffering with his head on the ground. He said that he had been inflicted by some sharp instrument. He did not discover any wounds on the back until three days afterwards. Ryder was not aware of these cuts himself until afterwards. The only wound that was at all dangerous was one that had cut into the joint on the wrist. This is the wound that is suppurating now and causing such trouble. It would still be a week or more, the doctor stated, before Ryder would be able to give testimony.

After hearing Mr. Patton's testimony, which was along the same line as that given by the girl, and developed nothing in the case was adjourned until the next day of the evidence of the complainant, Ryder.

Discovery of an Underground River. AUGUSTA, Ill., March 20.—An underground river has been discovered four and a half miles northwest of this place, between Augusta and Carthage. A few days ago William Allen dug a well on his farm in that locality, going to a depth of 77 feet and suddenly the auger dropped through the bottom of the well. What water had accumulated also went through the hole. The hole was plugged with clay and debris and the well again filled with water but suddenly the entire bottom fell out. Nothing was then left but a deep hole in the ground at the bottom where could be seen a swift running stream. Rubbish, staves, logs and other debris have been cast into the hole to fill it up but the rushing current carries it away almost instantly. Efforts have been made to sound the depth of the subterranean stream but they too have been futile.
