"'Mr. Umpire' has a hard road to travel and has little sympathy, I can tell you. No matter how hard he strives to please he is sure to be called down good and hard by the crowd getting the worst end of the game, and this is especially true if the home team is losing. The rooters are sure to say he is giving the game

"Holding the indicator is no easy

job, I can tell you, and we know when we are up against it. Of course, we are just as liable to make mistakes judging balls and strikes as the batters are, and you know how many times they misjudge the balls. On a cloudy day the pitcher with usually has the best success, because it is harder for a batter to judge a fast ball when the light is not good, but on the other hand a ball with a curve to it is seen to advantage when is shining brightly. The pranks of the ball do not affect the batter alone, the umpire has troubles in trying to render a fair decision. A curved ball is easily judged, but the man behind the plate with the indicator is up against a fast ball with an up or down shoot. Pitchers often have been fooled just as well as the umpire and the batter, but as all hands are fooled what is to be done? Why, make the best of it and render what appears to be the fairest decision.
