dependent Part of Empire.St. John's, Nfld., March 31.—In the
Legislature last night Premier Bond said
that no correspondence had passed be-
tween the Government of Newfoundland
and that of Canada respecting confeder-
ation. However, the Imperial Govern-
ment having forwarded a copy of a
resolution adopted by the Congress of
Chambers of Commerce of the British
Empire at Montreal last August last, fa-
voring confederation, the Newfoundland
Government had replied that it could not
concur in the part of the people of
Newfoundland for the inclusion of the
colony as a constituent part of the
dominion. On the reply said, there was
an evident desire that the colony should
maintain its autonomy and continue to
retain its independent position as a part

Anglo-Russian Agreement.St. Petersburg, March 30.—The Novoe
Vremya this morning executed a face-
about, strongly supporting the idea of
a Russo-British understanding, in an
editorial entitled "The Blindness of En-
gland." In which the paper argues that
the success of Japan would be more in-
jurious to Great Britain than to any
other European nation, and points to
the United States as the common rival
of both. It describes Japan as "Ameri-
ca's sharpshooter," and says:
"Remember what nation, in the person
of the commander of one of its men-of-war,
at Chemulpo, refused to the collec-
tive protest of the other foreign com-
manders, before the Japanese destroyed
the Varieg and the Korietz. Remember
whose flag alone among all did not take
on board the crews of our perishing
ships. To the honor of England, the
ally of Japan, it was not her representa-
tive, but the commander of an Ameri-
can ship, The Americans wish to con-
vert the Pacific into an American Medi-
terranean. Could that be to the advan-
tage of England? Does England not un-
derstand her blind policy and hatred
toward Russia that she is turning this
ocean into an American Mediterranean?
Will she recognize that America is her
mutual enemy. Why should not Russia
and England, in view of their possessions
outside of Europe, combine? Someone
will do England a great service by warn-
ing her of the economic and, perhaps,
political, Sedan which will be effected by
the Japanese and Americans. Russia
does not want India, but only access to
the open sea from Vladivostok and Port
Arthur."**A FLURRY IN MATRIMONY**Big Rush for Licenses at Windsor
Because of Reaume's Measure.Windsor, Ont., March 31.—The marriage
license issued by Windsor declare that
the bill introduced by Dr. Reaume in the
Ontario Legislature to amend the mar-
riage act, has had the desired effect,
upon the marriage license traffic in Win-
dors. The number of licenses issued has
increased. "Many couples, fearing that
the marriage act, as proposed by Dr. Reaume,
would pass the Legislature, have pushed
their intended marriages, and the busi-
ness has boomed. They did not want
their names printed in the papers, as
prescribed in Dr. Reaume's bill, and so
they have hurried to get their marriages
solemnized before the act passes. We
have had about fifteen couples a day
since the papers first took up the dis-

quarter, presumably Chinese waters. The
cruisers are therefore remaining in or

PREFERENCE IDEA**Canadians Actively Engaged
in the Old Country.**DISCOURTESY TO CHURCHILL**Balfour Declares He Stands for Re-
tention, Which Is Progressive
Free Trade.London, March 30.—President Drum-
mond, of the Canadian Manufacturers'
Association, interviewed last night on
his return to London after spending the
week end with Lord Brassey at Battle,
Sussex, said: "We have been invited
to talk with the political leaders and
business men." He had a long confer-
ence with Colonial Secretary Lyttelton.
The conference was confidential, but
Mr. Drummond said: "Wherever we
go we find a keen desire for the ap-
pointment of a royal commission (to
investigate and report upon the prefer-
ential question), having full colonial
representation, Mr. Chamberlain's and
other commissioners and committee
be supplementary. The Liberals gen-
erally refuse to commit themselves to
the preference idea, but reply, 'Wait
till we get Mr. Drummond. He
thinks a preference is bound to suc-
ceed. Mr. Ames, of Montreal, is con-
ducting a campaign in the north of
England.'"The Financial Times, referring to a
total decline in the G. T. P. receipts

the Lieutenant-Governor.Sturgeon Falls, March 31.—A public
meeting at Sturgeon Falls last night
discussed the petition to the Lieuten-
ant-Governor calling for the disallowance
of the school bill. A resolution was also
carried, calling upon the town school
board to petition the Lieutenant-Gov-
ernor. The meeting was held in the
school hall. The school board may take
divert public school taxes to separate
schools. The schools, as is pointed out
by a correspondent, are chiefly sup-
ported by French Roman Catholics and
Irish Catholics prefer the public school.
The bargain had its origin in a promise
by the original projector of the paper
industry to divide the taxes. The
present owners are not bound by the
promise. Mr. Craig, the president, re-
sents the diversion of the taxes. What
action the school board may take is
unsettled. The separate school sup-
porters contend that there was a prom-
ise to the public school, and insist on
its being carried out.**WILL LAY OFF 200**G. T. R. Retrenchment Policy Hits
Stratford Hard.Stratford, March 31.—Stratford is
being hit hard as a result of the re-
trenchment policy to be pursued by
the Grand Trunk. Master Mechanic
Patterson, who returned to the city re-
cently, stated that about two hundred
men would be laid off on April 1. Mr.
Patterson said that the officials very
much regret the necessity for economy,
but they had a deficit to make up as
a result of the losses sustained during
the severe winter, and they were bound
to retrench. The present staff of
workmen number about 900, of whom
about 250 were added during the past
year. The reduction will, therefore,
bring the staff down to about the
usual strength, 700. This action is re-
gretted very much, but it is hoped the
lay-off will be only temporary. It is
presumed that the reduction will fall

FEAR MASSACRE**Think Easter Day Has Been
Chosen for a Whole-
sale Butchery.Berlin, March 31.—An article pub-
lished by the Viedomosti, a well-known
Russian newspaper, has caused a sen-
sation in St. Petersburg. The editor of
the paper announces that he is receiv-
ing many letters from Jews in Odessa
asking for assistance because of a
widespread rumor that another mas-
sacre of Hebrews will begin on Easter
day. The population is in a very ex-
cited state. Many proclamations have
been issued against the Jews, inciting
the populace to murder and plunder.
The editor adds that he learns from
reliable sources that the chief anti-
Semitic paper published in St. Peters-
burg is being attributed free of charge,
and that anti-Semite speakers have
gone to Odessa to make speeches, in
which they will declare that the Jews
are the real cause of the Russo-Japan-
ese war, because they sympathized
with the Japanese victories. A depu-
tation of the Jews asked the governor
for protection. He told them that un-
less they ceased to be Japanese in
their souls he would leave them de-
fenceless. There are 1,200,000 Jews liv-
ing in Odessa. The poorer classes of
that nationality are in a condition of
panic.**ANDREW SPOUTS AGAIN**Says Britain Should Depend Upon
United States for Her Wheat.London, March 31.—Andrew Car-
negie was sitting in the form of a
dialogue, which appears in the Nin-
teenth Century, the prosperity of this
country with the object of showing
that the United States are the only
"how unreasonable." In answer to one,
Britain's appeals to Flora, goddess of
harvest, in which he makes Britain
say, "Help us to become a self-suffi-
cient empire, keep us no longer de-
pendent upon a republic for our food
and our cotton." Carnegie makes the
goddess say: "Know this, therefore,
that the best and safest position pos-
sible for thee is that thou be not de-
pendent for thy chief supply of food
upon the colonies, where thy food is
subject to capture, but upon an in-
dependent republic of thine own race,
the United States, who are the only
safety. Madness it were on thy part
to disturb the friendly relations, con-
ditions and tendencies which constan-
tly are drawing you closer. Hear this
mark us well, stir not up strife with
thy kith beyond sea."**SAYS THEY WERE BIASED**B. C. Justice Handled His Grand
Jury Without Gloves.Vancouver, B. C., March 31.—A
great sensation was caused in the as-
sise court yesterday when Chief Justice
Hunter declared that if a Chinaman
brought before him on a charge of
criminal libel, had been a white man he
would never have been arrested. His
lordship intimated that the mongro
was not guilty, and that it was utterly
ridiculous to suppose that if he had
been white the grand jury would have
returned a true bill. The crown law-
yers hastily consulted and decided to
withdraw the case.
"You are acting wisely," was his
lordship's grim comment. Counsel
for the prisoner asked for costs, and
the noted Ontario cases. The chief jus-
tice awarded costs against the private
prosecutor, a policeman named Keeler
