ATTEMPTED SWIM OF SEVEN MILES

Desperate Battle for Life of Bayfield Fishermen

WHEN THEIR BOAT CAPSIZED

One Lashes Himself to Craft, But Is Driven to Take to the Water and Perishes.

Bayfield, Aug. 22.—The search for the bodies of the two fishermen, William Bailey and William Wood, lost Saturday with James Ferguson, in the capsizing of their boat, the Daisy, still continues, and, as the details of their desperate fight for life are learned, one of the most dramatic stories of the lakes is unfolded.

How James Ferguson, lashed to the pump log and net box by his suspenders, battled with the gale all Saturday afternoon, how he struggled all Saturday night and Sunday morning, to reach land, never will be known. All the evidence goes to show that when his body was found about 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon by a farmer eight miles north of Bayfield, he had been dead only a few minutes; in fact, the farmer says he was still breathing.

What became of Bailey and Wood after they took off their clothing, stowed it away in the lockers of the boat, and leaped into the water, is yet to be learned.

It is a coincidence that the Daisy twice before capsized; on one occasion three men were drowned, on the other its occupants were rescued.

About 5 o'clock last Saturday morning, Mrs. Frank Glass, London Junction, who is spending her holidays here, looking from her window, remarked to her husband:

"There go Mr. Ferguson, Mr. Bailey and Mr. Wood. I should think it would be dangerous to go out this morning; but fishermen are supposed to be good judges of weather, and I guess it is going to be fine."

None of the other boats ventured out, but Ferguson, Bailey and Wood, sailed to their fishing grounds, about ten miles out, drew in six nets and set four others.

About 1 o'clock they started back with their catch. A squall came up suddenly half an hour later.

William Jewett, with a friend, was standing on the beach watching the returning boat through his glass. The weather thickened rapidly. A thunderstorm threatened and within a few minutes the waves were capped heavily and dashing violently on the shore.

"There they are," said Jewett, and handed the glass to his companion. "I cannot see them," returned the other.

Jewett took the glass again. He could not see the boat that a minute before had been holding her own.

The boat not having returned at 5 o'clock, Mr. Jewett, after a few minutes' search and a search was begun at once.

No sign of the missing boat or her crew was found that night, and early the next morning, Ferguson's father went to Goderich and enlisted the services of the tugs Huron, Evelyn and Edward Blake.

These were joined by three sailing boats from this port and the search was renewed.

One of the sailing boats found the jib boom of the Daisy just pointing above the water about five miles south of Bayfield. The boom was in fact fathoms of water in a perpendicular position.

The Huron was hailed, and her whistle summoned the other boats.

The Daisy was towed to the Bayfield wharf and overhauled. In the lockers was found the clothing of Bailey and Woods.

In the evening word was brought that the body of Ferguson had been found. Dr. Smith examined the body. He announced that his death was the result of exposure, not of drowning.

It appears that when it was seen that the boat would capsize, Bailey and Wood took off their clothes, stowed them in the lockers, and leaped to shore, about seven miles, in the desperate hope that they could make it.

Ferguson, apparently, was busy with the sails, and did not have time to follow their example, even if he intended to do so.

When the boat went over, the theory is, he caught the net box and pump log, took off his suspenders and lashed himself to the improvised raft.

Then, apparently, he attempted to fight his way to land.

Ferguson and Bailey were the owners of the Daisy, and Wood was in their employ.

Bailey's father intended to give him a farm this fall. The son, to fill in his time until fall, joined Ferguson in the purchase of the Daisy from Wm. Jewett.

They knew the boat was of faulty construction, and why they should have ventured out Saturday is not understood here.

Ferguson leaves a widow and one child.

Bailey was to have been married this fall.

PATHETIC CASE IN COUNTY JAIL

Young Scotchan of Good Character Imprisoned for Misdemeanor—Has Deadly Illness.

Arrested for breaking the law, tried at the police court or in the county jail, and sentenced to a term in the lock-up. This is all that the general public learns about most of the prisoners confined in the county jail on Ridout street. And yet the dozen or so words which are used in a court book to sum up a case, often stand for a large piece of pathetic human history.

Looking over these terse records of indictments and sentences in the local police court blotter, one would not pause more than a second over the case of William Morgan, place of birth, Scotland; charge, theft of a gold watch, found guilty; sentence, three months in the Central Prison. And yet Morgan's case is one of the most pathetic of the local jail, where he has served about half of his sentence, and the authorities are kindness itself to him.

About 18 years of age, with a few words, which he has made in his thin frame, pale face and hacking cough tell a sad story. He is a victim of America's terrible lung trouble, and he is in a fair way to die.

He feels like it. The jail physician is treating him regularly, but can give no hope of a permanent recovery.

Morgan lived in Scotland until three months ago. His lungs were weak and his family sent him out to this country, knowing the fame of Canada's healthy climate, but not realizing that a man with affected lungs is better off in Scotland.

Morgan found his way to this city, and secured a situation. His health did not improve and he grew despondent. In the old country whisky was part of his medical treatment, but it proved his curse. Wine and the influence of alcohol one night he did a deed that he would not have thought of at any other time. A friend gave him his watch to pawn for him. Morgan did so, but having used all his own money he kept the money which he got for the watch, and he was arrested.

He was brought into the police court with the above-mentioned result.

Morgan is a great favorite with the friends of the poor in this city. In this city, and all give him a good character. It is known that his family in Scotland is an honest and a good one. They would be proud to have their son in his present condition. The man did not mean to do wrong. The friends must take his course, but sometimes it is not wise to let him go.

Muskoka would be a better place for Morgan than the county jail. He has been induced to move west as soon as he is released.

All circumstances considered, Morgan's case is one of the most pathetic that has come up in the local courts.
