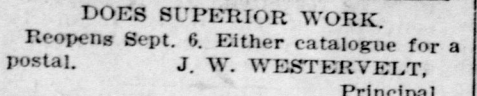

REVENUE DECREASED

Customs Collections for August Not So Great as a Year Ago.

There was a decrease in the customs revenue during August, from that of August last year, at London. The revenue during the month just closed was \$73,493.21, while in August, 1903, it was \$75,261.41, or \$1,768.20 more.

Collector Burns said that this was no doubt accounted for the earlier buying that took place this year, there being an increase of about \$20,000 in July over the same month last year.

BUSINESS BRISK AT POLICE COURT

Busier Times Than in 1903, According to Clerk Moule's Official Returns.

During the eight months ended Aug. 31, there were about 160 more cases at the London police court than there were during the same period of 1903. The clerk, Mr. Moule, who always has his work up to the day, had the statistics ready this morning for the quarter ending yesterday. This means that all the convictions had been entered from the conviction papers, and the court record and the two copies made for Osgoode Hall and the county crown attorney.

During the quarter, there were 165 summary convictions for non-indictable offenses, including drunkenness, disorderly conduct, assault, keeping disorderly houses, breaches of the liquor license and apprentice acts, breaches of city bylaws and such offenses. This is 20 more than during the corresponding quarter of last year, when there were 145 summary convictions.

WILL SUE THE PERE MARQUETTE

Wm. Burris Asks Damages for Injuries Received While Riding on a Train.

Mr. R. M. C. Tothie, on behalf of William Burris, of this city, has issued a writ against the Pere Marquette Railway, claiming unstated damages for injuries alleged to have been received by Burris while riding on the platform of a car near Port Stanley. Burris claims there was insufficient accommodation for the passengers, and that as a result he was crowded off the car while it was in motion, suffering severe injuries to his foot and leg. The accident happened some weeks ago, and Burris is still a patient at Victoria Hospital.

He claims that the company has been negligent, and he asks damages as stated.

ALL MEMBERS NOT INTERESTED

Only Two Aldermen Attend the Meeting of the Fire and Light Committee.

The market, fire and light committee of the city council was to have held a meeting last night, but a quorum failed to appear in an appearance, only Chairman Matthews and Ald. Garrett being present. Under the circumstances, nothing was done beyond the passing of the accounts. Ex-Fireman Crawford and his solicitor, Mr. R. M. C. Tothie, were present, but the Crawford case was not dealt with. The chairman ordered Secretary Bell to notify No. 1 committee that No. 3 committee wants five of the two free spaces to which the city is entitled under the recently signed agreement with the Bell Telephone Company. One of these spaces will be placed in the store of Charles E. Ward, on Forward avenue, West London, so that it may be used for fire alarm purposes as well as police and hospital uses. It is also suggested that the phone be made a public one, and that the Bell Company be permitted to collect whatever revenue it brings in. To put up an alarm box would cost the city fully \$500, so that even if the city had to pay \$15 a year for a phone, it would be money in pocket.

LOOKS LIKE A WAR

Honduras Concentrating Troops on the Nicaraguan Frontier.

New Orleans, Sept. 1.—The troops of the Republic of Honduras are being sent to the Nicaraguan frontier in preparation of a serious conflict between the two republics. The old boundary dispute about the lands along the Segovia River, for several years the cause of friction, has been renewed, and Honduras is now concentrating a strip of land fifteen miles in length, with a frontage of about 100 miles, on the Nicaraguan frontier.

Two years ago the Nicaraguan Government granted to the United States a concession of building a canal, a concession comprising the entire military zone in the districts of Cape Gracias and Nueva Segovia, about 200 miles in length, with a frontage of about 100 miles. The concession was granted to the United States for a period of 99 years, and the United States is now building a canal through the zone.

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MAN WEIGHS SUN'S CORONA

Swiss Astronomer Solves the Light Puzzle

AND SETTLES SOLAR QUESTION

Says the Sunshine Is Due to the Radiation From Minute Dust Particles.

San Francisco, Sept. 1.—The sun's corona, or surrounding luminous field, weighs about 25,000,000 tons, according to Professor August Svante Arrhenius, of the University of Stockholm, who has just visited the Lick Observatory at Mount Hamilton to make extensive solar observations. Professor Arrhenius' scales for weighing this enormous mass were the atmosphere, the temperature and the telescope. He and other astronomers at the observatory are surprised that the sun's corona is shown to be so exceedingly light, considering that it occupies a space several million miles in diameter.

Besides computing the weight of the corona, Professor Arrhenius has settled other great problems that long have puzzled astronomers. One of the most puzzling of the coronal light, over which two schools of astronomy disagreed, was the effective temperature of the corona. Professor W. W. Campbell, director of the Lick Observatory, and Mr. Perrine, his assistant, held that the light of the inner portion of the corona is due to the radiation from minute dust particles maintained at a temperature of incandescence by the enormous heat of the adjacent solar surface, and that the light from the outer corona is composed mainly of sunlight reflected by the colder dust particles composing this part of the corona. These conclusions were based on the character of the spectrum of the corona.

On the other hand, observers of the Smithsonian Institution measured the quantity of heat from the corona and were surprised to find that even in the immediate proximity of the solar surface the effective temperature was substantially that of the room in which they were observing. They, therefore, held the view that the main source of light from the corona is the incandescence of its particles, but that the radiations are in the nature of an electrical discharge.

Professor Arrhenius has harmonized the results of all previous observations by showing that the minute dust particles in the coronal region must be at a temperature of 800 degrees Fahrenheit, and, therefore, must be radiating light by virtue of their incandescence, but the particles are so few and far between that the effective temperature observed is not the temperature of the particles themselves, but the average temperature for the incandescent particles. He assumes that the corona is only one minute dust particle for each fifteen cubic yards of space.
