The inspector says that for some unknown reason the train was delayed a couple of hours at Melrose, a few miles out of London. When asked what he suspected was the cause of the delay, Mr. Sanders replied that it is more difficult to inspect horses in the dark than in the day time. At all events, when the animals arrived the inspector was able to see that they were in open cars, and there was not even a blade of straw under them. They appeared to straw under them. They appeared to be half frozen and half famished, but Mr. Sanders was at a loss to know just what to do. He found that there was no person accompanying the shipment, and that they had not been fed at Chatham. The local freight agent of the C. P. R. stated that he had been informed that the animals had been informed that the animals had been fed at Detroit, but of course, he had no proof of it. The way bill also showed that the horses had been loaded at Chicago on Monday and had been ever since on the road. They are destined for St. John, N. B., and Mr. Sanders was told that orders had been left to feed them at Toronto. left to feed them at Toronto. The poor brutes are western horses and have grown long coats, else it is the opinion of Mr. Sanders they would have perished with the cold. As it is,

DEFENDANTS APPLALED

Globe Company Wants to Have a Judgment Set Aside.

In the court of appeal at Toronto. yesterday, in the case of Miller vs. Globe Printing Company, A. B. Aylesworth, K. C., for defendants, appealed R. 369), in favor of plaintiff in an aceration for services as advertising representative of the defendant company in the western district of Ontario, from May, 18, 1901, to Oct. 23, 1903, under the terms of a contract constituted by two letters which passed between parties in May, 1901.
