**INTERESTING CASE
IN HIGH COURT****Widow Asks For Construction
of Late Husband's Will.**

An interesting case was argued at some length in the weekly high court before Justice Teetzel Saturday morning when Mrs. Susie Amelia Davey applied for a construction of the will of her deceased husband and for a declaration that under the will she is entitled to the estate in the Township of Westminster in fee simple. Decision was reserved.

By the will of the deceased he devised all property to his wife for her use and benefit as long as she lives with full power to use the same as she may require or desire for her own benefit, with gifts over divided equally among the brothers and sisters, the defendants.

LATE MRS. LAURIE

Aged Lady Died at Her Home Near Corbett.

The Parkhill Review contains the following account of the death of Mrs. Alexander Laurie, of Corbett, who was well known throughout the County of Middlesex:

The late Mrs. Alexander Laurie died at her home near Corbett on Monday, Dec. 12, 1910, aged 80 years, 6 months and 17 days. Mrs. Laurie's maiden name was Marion Thompson and she was born in Dumfriesshire. She was married at Oshawa and she and her husband, who died in 1899, moved to lot 6, con. 22, McMillanville, in 1878.

Mrs. Laurie was stricken with paralysis in Corbett Presbyterian Church on Sunday morning. She has been Bible class teacher for the past 15 years and had just finished teaching the lesson when it was noticed that she was sitting with bowed head. Upon examination it became apparent that this faithful servant had been stricken while at her post of duty. Dr.

Caw was summoned and she was removed to her home. She never rallied and passed away on Monday. To be in possession of her faculties up to the last, to be permitted to labor until the last conscious moment, to have the heart and the mind with which to go to a class Sunday after Sunday as she went down the slope and the shadows grew long behind her, who could ask for a more beautiful old age or for a kinder death than this. God was gracious to His servant and filled her years with usefulness and blessing.

She leaves three sons, Alex., of Nebraska; James, of Rebecca; John, on the homestead, and four daughters, Mrs. Wm. Leask, Oshawa; Mrs. Geo. Jones, Ottawa; Mrs. Jas. McIntosh, Newbraska and Mrs. Freeman Talbot, Hightgate.

The funeral took place on Wednesday.

A HEBREW SENATOR

Canadian Federation of Zionists May Request Appointment of One.

Toronto, Dec. 17.—The eleventh annual convention of the Canadian Federation of Zionists will be held in this city on Dec. 23 to 25.

It is expected that there will be over 100 delegates present, representing the various Jewish societies from the Atlantic to the Pacific. The question of acquiring land in Palestine will be debated and dealt with. It is also expected that the immigration policy of the Government will be the main topic, as will the question of representation in the legislatures, and also the making of representations to the Government for the appointment of a Jewish senator, there being now over 100,000 Jews in Canada, having large interests in the country.

Among the delegates will be Clarence I. DeSola, consul-general of Belgium, president of the Zionist Federation; Rabbi Nathan Gordon, of Montreal; Rabbi Abramowitz, of Montreal; Rabbi Kanahavitz, of Winnipeg.

GOING TO ST. THOMAS.

Goderich, Dec. 19.—Rev. Dr. Douglass M. A. B. D., pastor for three years of North Street Methodist Church, has accepted an invitation to the First Church, St. Thomas, subject to the approval of the stationing committee of London Conference. His present congregation have consented

GOVERNOR-GENERAL**

Earl Grey Will Give a Big Dinner in His Honor.

[Associated Press.] Albany, N. Y., Dec. 18.—Governor-elect John A. Dix left Albany tonight for Canada to settle some private business affairs. He expects to return Thursday. The governor-elect was accompanied by Democratic Chairman Wendell A. Huppach, a business associate. John Dix Coffit, a nephew, and two nieces, daughters of Curtis N. Douglas, of this city. The party travelled in a private car attached to the Montreal express, which left at 11 o'clock.

On Wednesday Earl Grey, governor-general of Canada, will give a dinner in honor of the governor-elect. Mr. Dix's journey will take him into the Canadian wilds in the vicinity of Lake St. John, north of Quebec, and he expects to devote part of his time during his absence to the preparation of his message to the Legislature.

WED BESIDE COFFIN

Best Man Was Electrocuted, But Wedding Went On.

[Associated Press.] Niagara Falls, N. Y., Dec. 18.—Pretty Leah Updike, aged 19, and Fern S. McCosha had planned that Saturday should be their wedding day, but when Miss Updike's brother Roger was electrocuted in one of the local electro-metallurgical plants and brought home dead, fears were entertained that the wedding might have to be postponed, as the dead brother was to be best man.

However, the electrocution was not permitted to delay the tying of the nuptial knot, as the bride determined could her dead brother speak he would say the original plan should be carried out. So the wedding party gathered in the room of death, where, at the side of the coffin, the wedding vows were pronounced, the officiating clergyman nearly collapsing under the strain.

In the afternoon the funeral of the dead man was held.

A GREAT RUN

The Giant Mauretania Will Probably Break All Records.

[Associated Press.] New York, Dec. 19.—The giant Cunarder Mauretania warped into her dock before sunrise today, ending the longest of her "Marsey to Marsey" voyage to establish a world's record. The demands of the Christmas season were responsible for the flying round trip which the Mauretania is making, the steamship bringing in no less than 4,813 sacks of Christmas mail and returning with holiday mail for England.

Battling with barricades of water during the entire voyage, the Mauretania covered the distance from Daunt's Rock to Ambrose Channel in 4 days 20 hours and 7 minutes. Ordinarily the Cunarder would have anchored outside last night, but instead she came up the channel. Health

officers were waiting at quarantine and after an inspection of three-quarters of an hour the steamship was released at 2:57 o'clock this morning. The customs officers did not board the ship until sunrise, when the passengers were ready to depart.

The Mauretania sails at 6 p.m. tomorrow, and in the 37 hours in port must unload and load thousands of tons of freight and baggage and store 6,200 tons of coal.

The Mauretania is to dock at Liverpool next Thursday evening, making the round trip in 12 days, a new record.

A very pleasant event took place at the home of Mr. Alex. Graham. Lobo, on Wednesday, when his daughter, Miss L. Gertrude, was united in marriage to Mr. Robert E. Morris, of Hyde Park.

The ceremony was performed by Rev. R. Marshall, of Komoka, at four o'clock, in the presence of about 40 guests. After congratulations were tendered to the happy couple, all repaired to the dining room, where a wedding supper was served. The bride was the recipient of many beautiful presents. The hearty good wishes of their hosts of friends will follow them to their new home.

FELL THROUGH BRIDGE.

Toronto, Dec. 18.—John Ferris, a fireman, employed at the city waterworks pumping station, fell through an opening in the John street bridge, while on his way home, and landed on the cabin of a shunting engine below.
