DOGGIE'S CHANGE OF AIR

Now Ordered Rest From Strain of Season.

London, Sept. 28.—Dogs, it seems, are ordered change of air by their medical attendants in much the same way as their masters and mistresses. The strain of a season's round on the show bench is said to try them severely, and a week or a month at a watering place is recommended as a restorative. This year St. Margaret's Bay, on the Kentish shore, is the favorite seaside resort for dogs that are "run down."

Messrs. Dr. N. Collie and A. L. Munn, of London, England, have returned to Edmonton after two months spent in the Canadian Rockies on the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. One of the glaciers was being explored, a hitherto unknown region in the vicinity of Mount Robson, the highest peak in the Canadian Rockies, and were accompanied by a train of 20 pack horses, and they state that in some places the forests were so impenetrable, that they had to cut their way through. Several discoveries were made. In one locality they came across two great glaciers larger than any known in the Rockies, and sighted a towering peak that had the appearance of being even larger than Mount Robson, which is 13,700 feet above the level of the sea. One of the glaciers was 40 to 50 miles in length, and 7 to 10 miles in width, and of striking formation.

FATAL WRECK ON WHEELING & LAKE ERIE

Freight Cars Break Loose and Ram Excursion Train.

Canton, Ohio, Sept. 28.—Two men were killed, three seriously injured and a dozen persons received minor injuries in the wreck of a passenger train on the Wheeling and Lake Erie Railroad, three miles southeast of here last night.

The train was loaded with excursionists homeward bound after a day spent at the Canton aviation meeting. A cut of cars loaded with brick broke loose from a freight train, which was shifting at a brick plant, and started down the track.

They went through a switch and on the main track just as the passenger train rounded a curve and crashed into the train. The engine was thrown from the track and the baggage car immediately behind toppled over.

NEW ORLEANS WOMAN MAY BE MODERN BORGIA

Death of Four Members of Family by Poisoning May Be Charged to Her.

New Orleans, Sept. 28.—Annie Crawford, the young woman of French-American extraction, under arrest for the murder of a younger sister, whose life was insured in her favor, has admitted to the district attorney that she had administered morphine to the girl, but had done so in mistake. She declared last night that she had been in the network of circumstances which led to the death of her sister, Elise, a pretty stenographer, but also for the poisoning of three other members of her family, who have since mysteriously within the past fifteen months, all carrying life insurance in her favor.

The woman was arrested last yesterday, following a report from a chemist, who analyzed the stomach of the sister, after her death last Saturday, to the effect that he found traces of morphine. She declared last night after hours of questioning, that she had intended to give her sister calomel and soda. She said she had stolen the morphine from the Presbyterian Hospital. After discovering her mistake, she was afraid to call in the doctor, and decided to say nothing about it. She admitted that she and her sister were not on good terms, asserting that Elise had not "treated her right."
