**"GOING DOWN" IS
MERCURY'S SONG**
Quicksilver Dives to Fifteen
Below, the Lowest of
Season.

CLEAR, SNAPPY WEATHER
Much Milder This Morning and East
Wind Signifies Fall of Snow.

The mercury did some deep-sea diving
last night, and as a result the ther-
mometer registered 15 degrees be-
low zero before it found bottom. At
one time it appeared that the bottom
of the glass would be the only limit
to its activity. This is by far the coldest
spell of this winter, and at the pre-
sent time there is no great desire
expressed to have it continued. The
coldest on Sunday was 10 below, at 8
o'clock last evening.

In the morning it registered 6 be-
low, but when the sun went down,
the silver thread of the thermometer
began steadily to fall until 8 o'clock,
when 10 degrees were counted. Then
it hesitated, but after midnight the
mercury did some more tumbling, and
it was not until 15 degrees below was
reached that it quit. Some thermom-
eters registered more than the official
instrument. At the G. T. R. station 18
degrees were registered, while other
thermometers throughout the city made
it from 15 to 20.

At 8 o'clock this morning the weath-
er men declare that another cold
snap will probably follow the snow-
storm. As a result there will be sev-
eral days of real zero weather.

The weather was keenly felt yester-
day, and as a result there were not
many people stirring. At certain hours
a busy day for the firemen, who were
called out to the deserted village. There
was scarcely a soul about the
churches were not filled to overflowing,
and those who had the courage to go
had many comments to make on the
fact that hats and truck coats are not
the best protection from the at-
mosphere, and frozen cars and nip-
ped fingers were rather common. The
ladies, with their Sunday wraps, also
invited a caress from Jack Frost. The
attendance at the churches was better than
anticipated, nevertheless.

Fire Side Looks Good.
The home-coming crowds after the
evening service ran into the cold
spell of the day, and a train of
thirty walking in blocks in that kind
of temperature, and the firesides were
gladly welcomed.

The steam roads maintained a satis-
factory schedule in spite of difficul-
ties. There was scarcely a train op-
erating, the majority being from half
an hour to two hours late. This was
due altogether to the cold. The
"heavy" rails and the difficulty in keep-
ing steam up to the right pitch were
accountable for the delay. The G. T. R.
was the only line that was not
taxed to the limit feeding the big pas-
senger engines in an effort to keep
them going right. A snowstorm added
to the temperature would have made
it bad for the railway. The G. T. R.
and C. P. R. officials were well sat-
isfied with the schedule maintained.

**MAKE BRITISH SUGAR
FROM BRITISH BEET**
Systematic Cultivation and Erection of
Factories in the Old Country.

[Canadian Press.]
London, Jan. 8.—After many experi-
ments and much preliminary discus-
sion the erection of sugar factories and
the systematic cultivation of the beet
in Great Britain are now, says the
Standard, matters of practical agricul-
ture.

Farmers and land-owners have long
considered the subject, and operations
of a local nature have been carried
on, but carried through to success, until
at last, from both an agricultural and
a financial point of view, the un-
doubted practicability of the production
of British sugar has been established.

The new and important com-
pany has been formed to undertake
the construction in one of the eastern
counties of a large, modern beet sugar
factory, bringing the whole question out
of the theoretical into the practical
stage.

**TO ERECT STATUE
FOR CAPT. COOK**
England Is Going to Remember Her
Most Famous Explorer.

London, Jan. 7.—Although most of
England's heroes are represented in
the capital of the empire by memorials
of various sorts, the famous explorer,
Captain James Cook, who lost his
life in the Hawaiian Islands, is not
numbered among them, but this over-
sight will soon be corrected by a so-
ciety which plans to erect a life-size
statue of the Mail to the great cir-
umnavigator.

The plan originated with Sir James
Carruthers, a former prime minister
of New South Wales. On a recent
visit to London he was surprised that
there was no statue here to the man
who was responsible in a large meas-
ure for the addition of the antipodian
territories to the British Empire.

He directed particular attention to the over-
sight, and the agitation resulted in the
appointment of a committee with
Postmaster-General Samuel at its head
to provide a suitable memorial. King
George V., at that time Prince of
Wales, accepted the presidency of the
society for the erection of the statue,
and although his elevation to the throne
has caused him to withdraw
from office in the matter, he continues to
be its heartiest supporter.

The Government offered its aid
through the medium of the board of
works, which provided an admirable
site for the statue on the Mall side of
the new Admiralty Arch. The design
and execution of the statue, which
will be unveiled some time next year,
has been intrusted to Sir Thomas
Brook.

SHOT BY MILLINER
Prominent American Resident of
Berlin Fatally Wounded.

Berlin, Jan. 6.—Norbert M. Rodkin-
son, a prominent member of the
American colony here, was shot prob-
ably with fatal effect, last evening by
a milliner named Alwynne Siede. The
woman was intercepted as she was
escaping from Mr. Rodkinson's office
after she had committed the crime,
and immediately fired a bullet into her
body which is not, however, like-
ly to prove fatal.

The crime, it is said, was brought
about by the interruption of long-
standing relations between the woman
and Mr. Rodkinson, and his refusal to
support her two children. Mrs. Rod-
kinson, however, asserts that it was
an attempt at extortion on the part
of Siede, who had been a servant of
the family years ago in Russia.

Mr. Rodkinson is a director of the
American Chamber of Commerce here
and has represented firms for many
years in Germany and Russia.

SILENCE IN THE COURT!
Police Commissioners Decide to Pur-
chase Matting for Floor.

Friday afternoon the police com-
missioners convened, and upon recom-
mendation of the chief and police mag-
istrate decided to purchase cork mat-
ting for the courtroom floor in order
to deaden the sound of cawing
drunks and prodigiously hooved law-
yers.

This morning the matting was in
shape, the job having been completed
before the opening of court at 10
o'clock.

The commissioners decided to pay
the hospital expenses of Policeman
Mills, who was seriously injured in en-
deavouring to stop a runaway team on
Richmond street, some months ago.

A resolution was passed expressing
the appreciation of the members of the
services rendered by Mayor Beattie
during his two years of office.

**BRITISH ACTORS IN
A DICKENS BENEFIT**
Famous Thespians Paid a Trib-
ute to Genius of the Great
Novelist.

London, Jan. 7.—The actors and
actresses of London this evening paid
a tribute to the genius of Charles
Dickens, when at the Coliseum Theatre
they gave a performance of the great
novelist's works in aid of a fund which
is being raised for his grandchildren.

The presentation was made up chiefly
of Dickens' plays and tableaux por-
traying familiar scenes and incidents
from the books of Dickens.

Practically all of those who took
part were stars. Seymour Hicks and
the company gave the one-act play,
"Scrooge," E. S. Willard and Miss Al-
xander. "Carriage an' a Horse" from
"Martin Chuzzlewit," Cyril Maude and
company a humorous scene entitled
"Mrs. Sairey Gamp," while the Fol-
lies presented "The Pious Edition of
Dickens' Works."

The trial, "Bardell vs. Pickwick,"
which was given by an all-star cast,
was the centrepiece of the evening,
among those appearing being such
famous performers as Sir John Hare,
Sir Geo. Alexander, Norman McKinnel,
Gerald Du Maurier, Huntley
Wright, and the Misses Irene Van-
Brugh, Mabel Hackney, Rosina Fil-
ippi and Eva March.

For the tableaux the curtain rose
on an exact replica of the famous
picture by Sir Luke Fields, R. A.,
entitled "The Empty Chair," repre-
sented Charles Dickens' library at
Gad's Hill. From the shadows of
the room, full of memories, the crea-
tions of the master-mind were evolved
by the "Spirit of Inspiration," imper-
sonated by Miss Ethel May.

Later there entered some of the
contemporaries of Dickens: Thackeray,
John Forster, Gladstone, D'Israeli,
Macready, and others, about 150 ac-
tress and actresses taking part. For
the finale the performers grouped
themselves around a figure of the
novelist.
