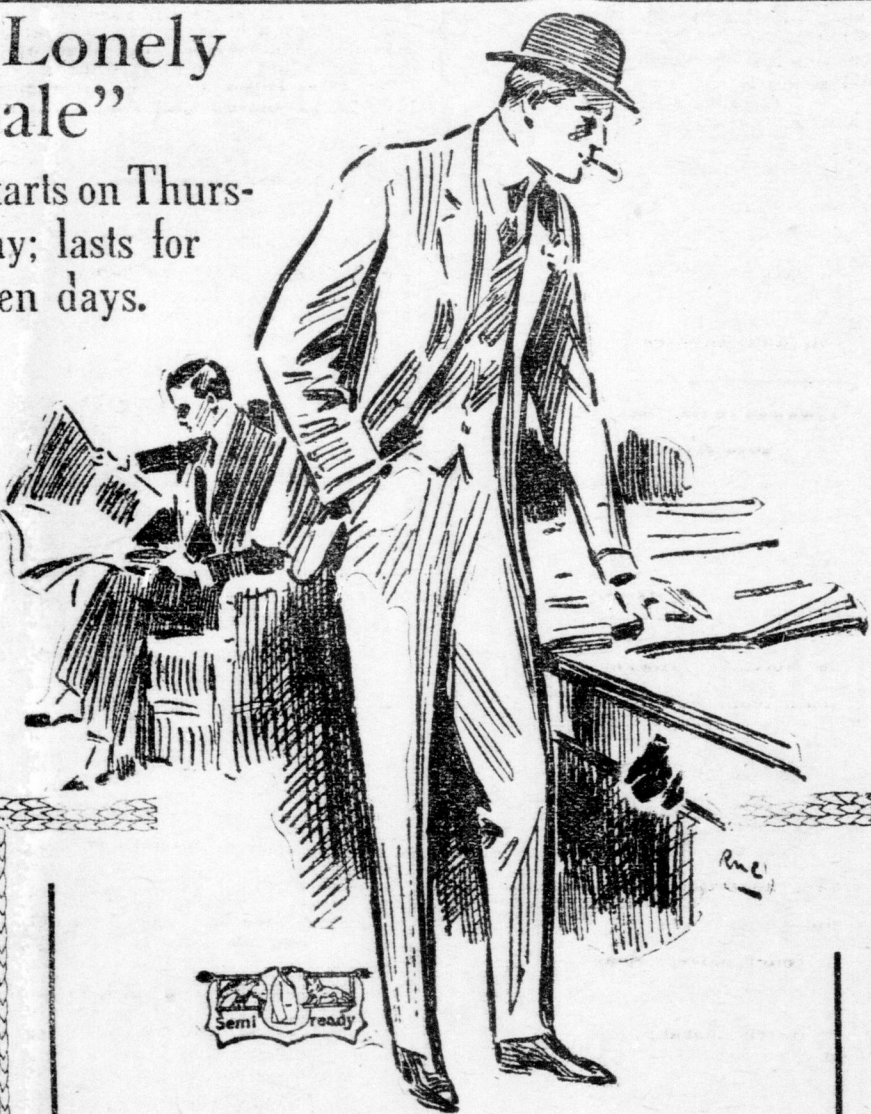

JOHNSON LODGED IN CHICAGO JAIL

Could Not Explain Why He Shipped His Two Autos to This Country.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—Jack Johnson, the negro heavyweight pugilist, was taken to the county jail here last night to await the judgment of Judge George A. Carpenter, of the United States district court, as to whether his bail bond of \$30,000 should be forfeited.

When the pugilist's party, consisting of his white wife, two white secretaries and valet, reached here after being turned back at Battle Creek, Mich., from a Canada-bound train, Johnson asked to talk over the telephone to Charles F. Dewoody, superintendent of the United States department of justice. At the conclusion of the conversation Johnson told Deputy Marshal Meyers that Mr. Dewoody would allow him to spend the night at his town home. Meyers refused to take the order unless from Mr. Dewoody direct. The pugilist and his retinue were taken in automobiles to Mr. Dewoody's residence.

"Johnson, if you did not mean to stay out of the jurisdiction of the federal court why did you ship two of your automobiles to Canada?" demanded Mr. Dewoody. The pugilist hesitated in his reply, and Mr. Dewoody gave him his choice of being held in a hotel in charge of marshals or of being taken to jail. Johnson chose the jail. He was allowed to take his wife home and to change his clothes, and then was locked up.

TWO BIG BASEBALL MEETINGS IN CHICAGO

National Commission and American Association Members Gather.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—Two important baseball gatherings are scheduled for Chicago tomorrow. One will be the annual session of the national baseball commission, which was to have been held in Cincinnati on Jan. 6, but was postponed on account of the illness of President Ben Johnson, of the American League. The other will be the yearly meeting of the club owners of the American Association.

The national commission will go through the formality of electing a chairman and secretary. August Hermann is expected to succeed himself in the first position, while John Bruce, it is announced, will be elected secretary. Hermann and President Lynch, of the National League, are expected to arrive in the city tomorrow morning.

The American Association members are expected to adopt a shorter playing schedule than the one in force last year.

GRAND CIRCUIT DATES WILL BE ARRANGED

100,000 DIVORCES IN THE UNITED STATES

More Than 70,000 Children Deprived of Both Parents Last Year.

New York, Jan. 15.—More than 70,000 children, mostly under the age of ten years, were deprived of one or both parents by divorce in this country during the past year, according to figures with which the Rev. Francis M. Moody stirred members of the New York State marriage and divorce commission at its meeting yesterday. "The Pacific coast," he said, "has been the greatest divorce centre of the entire world. In the year 1912 alone there were granted in the United States over 100,000 divorces."

Illinois Leads. In forty years 3,700,000 adults were separated by divorce, and more than 5,000,000 persons affected by these cases. Illinois alone provided 120,000 divorces, Pennsylvania 55,760, California 50,000, and New York 44,450. New York State, however, sent 18,163 of its couples into other states to be divorced, and there were probably many migratory cases that are not recorded in this total. At present 20 per cent. of the cases go by default, with only one party represented.

Mr. Moody offered a resolution to organize a federal commission in this state to work for a uniform federal law governing marriage and divorce, which should be the central organization for all state commissions of this character which have already been formed in some states, and which would meet in convention in Chicago in May. Rev. Dr. Samuel McCune Lindsay was appointed temporary chairman of an organization committee.

HUNGRY PETS' CRY REVEALED DEATH

New York, Jan. 15.—A score of hungry pets—cats and dogs, and a parrot and a turtle—crying for food, led neighbors to break into a Brooklyn apartment during the night, where they found Fannie Luff, a charity worker, sixty years old. It is believed she had been dead since Saturday, probably having succumbed to heart disease. A policeman who led the invading party of neighbors was almost bowled over by the rush of the hungry dogs and cats, which had long before picked clean to the bone a number of lamb chops strewn about the floor.

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O'ROURKE WAS ON WAY TO MEET NEGRO

Was Going to Toronto to Arrange Details of Palmer Bout.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 14.—Tom O'Rourke, Al Palmer's manager, stopped in St. Louis tonight on his way, he said, from Los Angeles, to Toronto, to meet Jack Johnson and the representatives of the French promoters, to come to terms for the proposed fight in Paris between Johnson and Palmer.

"The telegram Johnson showed in Battle Creek," said O'Rourke, "I sent him from the coast, and outlines the deal, except that M. Vienne offers \$30,000 or the privilege of 70 per cent house split."

"Now, I suppose, the arrangements must be made with Johnson by mail, as the Government seems determined not to allow him to leave the country even temporarily."

TO STOP FIGHTING IN CALIFORNIA

Bill Will Be Introduced in Legislature for This Purpose.

Sacramento, Cal., Jan. 15.—A bill was introduced in the Legislature yesterday by Senator Brown, of Los Angeles, which would prohibit prize fighting in California. The bill which makes prize fighting a misdemeanor provides that "boxing exhibitions" at which no admission fee is charged may be held, the exhibitions to be limited to ten rounds.

Contentious are prohibited from receiving any prize other than a medal or trophy not exceeding \$25 in value.

CORRESPONDENCE

Mr. Daly's Rejoinder. To the Editor of The Advertiser:

I must thank you for the attention and courteous criticism given my letter in which I urged the importance of the power and the responsibility of London if our city is to attain the growth and prosperity which are her due. My assertion that nearly all the great and flourishing cities of the world are situated at or near a waterway is called in question and I am asked to get out my old geography and examine the map afresh. Having done so, I rise from my perch, more convinced than ever that my contention is correct. The cities which you mention: Sheffield, Birmingham, Leicester, Nottingham, etc., together with Paris, Madrid, Vienna and Berlin, can be matched, and a little better than matched, by London, Liverpool, Manchester, Glasgow, Belfast, New York, Hong Kong, etc.

The great cities of Europe already mentioned are as you say capitals, and to this fact is due much of their importance. These cities are several centuries old, and their growth is due to a variety of causes. They are, however, cosmopolitan and attract each year many thousands of visitors from foreign countries, whose visits are made possible by cheap water transportation. Of course, I did not say that there could be no growth or prosperity without the aid of water freight rates, nor did I expect that the phrases, "Go on to the lake" would be taken literally, and that it would be gravely pointed out that St. Thomas must first be moved before London can pass that way! It is not always wise to place a literal interpretation on any scripture—sacred or profane.

Let us return to those English cities, London the greater. The history of that great metropolis is indissolubly bound up with her merchant marine. Her ships go out into all the world and return to her laden with the good things of the earth.

The prosperity of the inland cities mentioned was first due, of course, to the juxtaposition of iron and coal. But is the trade of these cities confined to the British Islands alone? Do they not depend upon water freight rates in shipping their goods all over the world, even to some of the wholesale houses in London, Ontario? Deprive these cities of this ocean traffic and what becomes of their prosperity? Cut off her foreign trade altogether and Great Britain would immediately sink to the grade of a third or fourth rate nation. Indeed, it is not too much to affirm that the might and greatness of Britain are based largely on water freight rates.

The city of Venice attained the power and prestige of a great state through her opulent trade with the Orient. When the Cape of Good Hope was discovered, that is to say, when the towns and cities of Western Europe obtained water freight rates, the power of Venice began to decay.

Then arose great empires—Spain, Portugal, the Netherlands, France and England—empires based on sea-power and water freight rates.

I once heard the late Honorable David Mills say: "It had been estimated that the trade and commerce, which Great Britain enjoyed through the possession of India, maintained a population of ten millions in Great Britain."

Providence has blessed this part of the North American continent with the largest body of fresh water in the world. When the Welland Canal is deepened ships will come direct from Europe to Detroit, Port William, Chicago and Duluth. An enormous traffic will pass by water from the ocean to the heart of the continent, and from the heart of the continent to the ocean. Many steamers will pass up and down Lake Erie. Will they call at Port Stanley? Will it be worth their while and do all the people of London wish them to call? Given cheap power and low freight rates and the people of Western Ontario may become one of the most prosperous communities on earth.

Canadians might learn some things from the Old Land. We are behind in many respects. In the matter of ownership and control of public utilities they are much in advance of us. In fact, the matter is so advanced that the British Government will take over the telephones at an expenditure of \$2,000,000. We might learn from the City of Glasgow, where the ownership and operation of public utilities has been reduced to a minimum, if that city were situated as London is, would her citizens hand over their own railroad to a private corporation? Hardly. How long would they tolerate such deplorable conditions as have obtained on the Port Stanley road during the past decade? Is London proud of her steam road?

I am informed that when first built fifty or sixty years ago it was a success; that Port Stanley was a flourishing and growing village; that a lake traffic of large proportions sprang up, and that the road paid its way. Then a change took place. The road was leased to the G. T. R., after which

PROBING "ARSON TRUST" AT THE WINDY CITY

Insurance Companies Mulcted Many Millions by Dishonest Adjusters.

[Canadian Press.]

Chicago, Jan. 15.—Evidence pointing to the existence of an "arson trust" in Chicago, composed of at least twenty persons, who have mulcted insurance companies out of millions of dollars yearly, has caused State's Attorney Roynce to start a widespread investigation.

Joseph Clark, a fire insurance adjuster, has been arrested in connection with his alleged attempt to bribe an assistant state's attorney who was conducting a grand jury investigation of a fire. Clark is said to have offered the attorney \$1,000 if "no bill" was returned in the case.

The arrest of Clark was followed by the secret examination of fifteen fire adjusters. It was said that they told that independent fire adjusters worked in a conspiracy with employees of insurance companies, lowering honest fire losses and raising incendiary ones. The inquiry was not ended until after midnight. It will be resumed today.

One of the men examined last night was Edward Covitz, of the firm of Covitz Bros., who is said to have offered the bribe. He denied any connection with the alleged bribery, saying he and his brother gave Clark the claim to settle, and then their activity in the case stopped. Covitz probably will be interrogated further today.
