NEW HAY IS SOLE MARKET OFFERING

A dozen loads of new hay are the sole offering on the market today. The large market of yesterday, however, was as large as several Saturday markets have been in the last month.

Vegetables were plentiful and much lower in price. Beets, onions, carrots, beans, lettuce and radishes were plentiful and prices dropped to the lowest this season. Old potatoes sold for \$1.50 and \$1.60 a bag, new potatoes brought \$1.60 and \$1.75 a bushel.

Vegetable marrow was on sale at \$1 a dozen. Beans sold for three from \$3 to 5 cents a quart. Tomatoes were 5 to 6 cents a quart. Potatoes were much cheaper, selling at 10 cents a pound.

Raspberries were in demand, but sold as low as 11 cents a bushel. Cherries were slow and the price remained high. Baskets holding 10 quarts sold as usual for 60 cents. Some finer kinds brought up to \$1.50 a basket.

Nearing the close there was quite a boom in prices, and at 1 o'clock the advance on Wednesday's close was 1/4 to 1/2 up. Rust reports were credited with being the sole cause of the advance.

Cash demand was more active today for all grains, fax being in keen request. They closed: Wheat, 1/4 to 1/2 higher for contract grades; oats unchanged to 1/2 higher; fax 1/4 to 1/2 advance, and barley 1/4 to 1/2 higher.

Deliveries through the clearing house: Wheat, 164,000 bushels; oats, 25,500 bushels; fax, 2,500 bushels; and barley, 10,000 bushels. In sight, 150 cars.
