## ALL PRICES FIRM AT TODAY'S MARKET

There were few changes on the market this morning, all prices remaining firm. Vegetables are the same prices as quoted on Friday, except cabbage, which is lower at 40 to 60 cents per dozen. Cabbages were offered for the first time this season at \$1.75 per dozen for culls and \$1.75 for good ones.

Raspberries were firmer and the price was a little higher at 13 to 14 cents a box. Black currants were selling at 14 to 15 cents a box. Butter and eggs held the same prices as on Thursday. Butcher's meats, hides and wool were firm at the same prices.

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## POINTERS FOR MARKSMEN FROM MILITIA DEPT.

Valuable Information for Rifle-men Who May Compete at Ottawa.

Owing to the change in the ammunition to be used at the rifle matches at Ottawa in September, the militia orders for the week contain some valuable information to marksmen regarding the difference in elevation which will be experienced in using the new pointed bullet. The new ammunition has been designated "Mark VII," in place of the old "Mark VI," ammunition, the bullets in which were round-nosed.

The new bullet attains a greater velocity and has a greater penetrating power. A higher elevation is also required in its use. The following table has been issued for general information.

At 200 yards, 2 inches higher elevation is required, and the rise in elevation to 1,000 yards is as follows:

Demonstration of the New Life Saver

Made at Pumping Station.

General Manager H. J. Glaubitz, of the water commission, went "pulmoting" yesterday, or to be more correct, he was pulmoted. There was a demonstration of the new pulmotor at the Horton street pumping station, and as no "subjects" volunteered to assist in the demonstration, the C. M. took off his coat and had the machine adjusted about his head.

Dr. Kilbourne, of Toronto, representing the pulmotor manufacturers, was in charge of the demonstration. He described the working of the machine and described its various parts to the group of superintendents and operators who were gathered for the instruction. The Toronto doctor gave a general first aid lecture, and there was a demonstration in the use and working of the pulmotor. Special instructions were given to the various employees of the commission who will have charge of the machine in cases of emergency.
