**Champions Were Completely Outclassed by Winners.**

KITCHENER, Feb. 3.—Kitchener intermediates will go to Galt on Tuesday night with a six-goal lead tucked away, outclassing the Galt crew here tonight, and trimming them by the score of 7 to 1. Both teams traveled at a fast clip throughout, with Galt showing their best in the first period. Karges counted for Kitchener after three minutes of play, and Oliver tallied for Galt in another three minutes. The Canadian Pacific are operating in their Vancouver express, leaving Toronto daily at 10:00 p.m. for Winnipeg, Calgary and Vancouver. Tourist sleepers of latest type.

This is a steel tourist car of newest type, through-out. Interior finished in plain mahogany, seats upholstered in leather. Plumbing represents the latest in sleeping cars, standard sleeping car, water-raising system, arranged to supply both hot and cold water to all wash bowls. Standard dental bowls are installed in smoking room and women's dressing room.

The kitchens are believed to be without equal. They are finished in white enamel, with white tile on top of work table to under side of lockers. The work table is polished Monel metal and the sink white enamel. A refrigerator is provided with sufficient capacity to take care of milk, butter, meats and other perishables; this refrigerator is lined with polished Monel metal. Its bottom shelf is provided with a metal tray, specially designed to hold milk bottles and so constructed that there are no solid corners and the openings permit of air circulation even when the tray is filled with bottles.

**WINNIPEG 'SPIEL STARTS MONDAY**

**Monster Western Tourney Is Expected To Draw 1,000 Curlers.**

WINNIPEG, Feb. 3.—Winnipeg will be the mecca of the majority of the noted curlers of Canada and the United States next week, when the 34th annual bonspiel of the Manitoba Curling Association gets under way on the morning of Monday, Feb. 6.—The Manitoba curling carnival has long been looked upon as the greatest winter sporting event in America, but this year it promises to surpass anything of the past. With more ice accommodation, owing to the erection of the new Thistle rink, and the curtailment in the program so that the play will not extend beyond a week instead of two as formerly, the entry list exceeds all previous years.

**Most Popular Pastime.**  
Curling is perhaps the most popular winter pastime in the West, and the game reaches its finest flower of perfection in Winnipeg. There are many reasons why the Winnipeg bonspiel is the greatest in the world. It is one of the best organized, has nearly every citizen behind it, and offers the best sport that can be found anywhere. There is hardly a town or village of any size in Manitoba or Saskatchewan that does not boast of a curling rink, and nearly everyone of them is affiliated with the Manitoba Curling Association. The growth of the Winnipeg bonspiel has been so marvelous that despite the fact the city boasts of eleven curling rinks, it will take nearly six sheets of ice, it has been found most difficult to reduce the play from two weeks to one week this winter. There are about 150 clubs in affiliation with the Manitoba Curling Association, giving a membership of approximately 6,000 curlers, and each year increases the growth and popularity of the game, which has stood the test in Western Canada for a long time.

**Draws Big Crowds.**  
The Winnipeg bonspiel is the magnet which draws every curler of any consequence from the far east, the west and south, altogether in social and championship competition in which the curlers of the world take part. Winnipeg for many years has been supreme in curling. The city has developed during bonspiel week with the result that many of the valuable prizes are being carried out of the city. The climatic conditions make Winnipeg ideal for staging such a mammoth affair. From a spectacular standpoint, the game is nearly as popular as hockey with its thrills. The rinks are always crowded during bonspiel week, and the large crowds follow the fortunes of the redoubtable representatives of the United States, and each year increases the growth and popularity of the game, which has stood the test in Western Canada for a long time.

**EVERYTHING IS AGAIN SET FOR BIG CITY 'SPIEL**

11 Sheets of Ice Will Be Used With Four More Available—Big Influx of Curlers Is Expected.

The postponed city of London bonspiel, which opens on Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, has been prepared for down to every last imaginable detail by the 'spiel committee, and there's nothing left in the way of one of the most successful curling events in the city's history only the usual "if," and this is all weather.

The 'spiel committee, in view of the hootch-laden antics of the weatherman the last week, are afraid to mention the word lest he turn round and put the soft tap on things.

A new program has been mailed to the curling clubs of Western Ontario outlining the event, and as they've had plenty of notice this time, there should be no dearth of entries.

Eleven Sheets of Ice.  
There will be eleven sheets of ice used, and everything to speed up the program has been thought of. If there are more entries than expected there are four sheets out at the Ontario Hospital rink which have been placed at the disposal of the 'spiel committee.

Tuesday morning a committee will meet all incoming trains, and the visiting men of the state will be taken in charge and their baggage looked after. Those rinks which were entered before have been asked to reaffirm their entries. Entries will be received by wire or letter by A. M. Trick, 380 Central avenue, secretary of the committee. And long-distance entries will be received by the 11th and 12th at 9 o'clock Monday night, when the draw will be made.

**PLATTSVILLE KEEP M'INTOSH TROPHY**  
Miine Captured Silverware This Year, Beating Bright Rink.

INGERSOLL, Feb. 3.—The McIntosh trophy emblem of the curling championship of Oxford, will stay in Plattsville another year. Last year it was captured by the J. B. English rink from that village, and at the annual Oxford bonspiel held here today the Miine rink of Plattsville annexed the silverware. The bonspiel was continued on the plus and minus system and the rinks divided into two groups, the winners playing off for the trophy and first and second prizes, while the runners-up played for the third and fourth.
