Claims Britain Dirtiest Place In Europe

LONDON, England, July 25 .-Lord Newton, speaking in the House of Lords yesterday, declared England and Scotland were the dirtiest countries in Europe.

Lord Newton quoted statistics to show that 300 tons o soot fall every year on each square mile of London, which was enough to build a pyramid four times as high as the famous clock tower over the Houses of Parliament.

He also said it was estimated that the smoke in Manchester caused an extra expenditure of £50,000 annually for washing men's collars, all due to practically unrestricted use of soft coal.
