SIX ARE INJURED IN TRAIN WRECK

C. N. R. Engine and Thirteen Cars Derailed West of Cambray.

 Lindsay, June 12.—Six people were injured, one seriously, when the C. N. R. Toronto mixed train was derailed two miles east of Cambray station this afternoon. Taylor, Parkin of L'Ordrige, ex-warden of Victoria County, seriously hurt about the head and internally, and John Gregg of Seaford, who was hit on the head and had one leg twisted, suffered the most serious injuries.
 Without any warning, the train, consisting of 13 cars, left the track, bumped on the rails for some distance and finally plunged into the ditch, six cars being tossed into the ditch, the passenger coach being hurled up against a telegraph pole and into an adjacent field, turning completely over in its flight.

WIN FOR MURDOCK, BUT PORTER STAYS

West Hasting Member Will Not Quit, Although Charges Collapse.

 Ottawa, June 12.—E. Guss Porter, M.P. for West Hastings, who preferred the charges made against Hon. James Murdock, minister of labor, with respect to withdrawals made by him from the Home Bank on August 15, was asked this afternoon what his attitude would be in view of the fact that a report exonerating Mr. Murdock from all blame was passed in the privilege and elections committee this morning.
 "Are you contemplating resigning your seat?" Mr. Porter was asked.
 "Not by a large majority," he replied emphatically. "I never thought of resigning. What I am thinking about is defeating that report in the House. That is my intention."
 It had been freely rumored that Mr. Porter would resign his seat and run again for re-election in West Hastings, challenging the government to put a candidate in the field on the issue of Mr. Murdock's guilt or innocence. Apparently he had not decided upon such a course.

FORMER DRESDEN RESIDENT DIES AT HOME IN DETROIT

Detroit, June 12.—John Edward French, 550 Hudson avenue, aged 51, a native of Dresden, died tonight. His widow, formerly Charlotte Wick, and one son and two daughters survive, and a sister, Mrs. Alfred Kimberly, at Dresden. A brother-in-law is Edward Wilson, president of the Old Boys' London Association at Detroit. He has been appointed governor of Western Australia in succession to Francis Newdegate. This will necessitate a by-election in Lewes which Camplin has represented since 1919.
