COUNCIL IN FAVOR OF VEHICLE LIGHTS

Will Co-operate in Plan To
Secure New Legislation
by Province.

BUSINESS CONCLUDED

St. Thomas, Dec. 1.—The final busi-
ness session of the city council was held
this evening. The "farewell" meeting
will be held after election.

The council decided to co-operate with
the chamber of commerce in a petition
to the government for lights on all
vehicles.

A request from the hospital trust that
a laneway turning off Scott street to
the Memorial hospital be put in good
condition was left with the city engi-
neer and the chairman of No. 2 commit-
tee with power.

The Canadian Oil Company was re-
quested to make the necessary changes
at their St. Thomas plant, to enable in-
surance companies to lower the rates on
adjacent property.

A sewer will be laid on Elm street,
east of the P. M. R. tracks, if residents
will pay half the cost.

Alimony was granted to Mrs. Mar-
garet Kendall, Iona, formerly of Pingal,
to the extent of \$50 a month, from her
husband, Harvey Kendall, a farmer of
the district. Costs amounting to \$125
were included in the judgment.

The Beck memorial drive, with ob-
jective at \$7,500, is well under way to-
day. Many large subscriptions are be-
ing received, and those in charge of
the drive expect the full quota to be
promised by tomorrow night.

Vital statistics for November are:
Births 29, marriages 14, and deaths 19.
Customs collections amounted to \$44-
210.75 during November, an increase of
\$11,184.47 over November of last year.
The employment situation in the city
is little improved from last year at this
time. Ninety-one people are out of em-
ployment, including four women. Thirty-
six are single and 50 married. The big-
gest class making application for as-
sistance are the laborers.

CHICAGO SHEEP PRIZE COMES TO W. ONTARIO

H. M. Lee of Highgate Wins
With Fat Cotswold
Class.

Chicago, Dec. 1.—New kings were
crowned at the International livestock
exposition today. L. A. Vogler of Hope,
Ind., three times grand sweepstakes
champion at the Indiana state fair, to-
day became the country's corn king
when his display of ten ears of white
corn took the highest award.

H. M. Lee of Highgate, Ont., and P.
B. Gaspell of Hampton, Ont., upheld
the prestige of Canada in the sheep
classes judged this morning. In the fat
Cotswold class the wether exhibited
by Lee was selected as the champion.
Gaspell's exhibit was chosen reserve
champion. Gaspell's animals were also
given the premier award for the pen of
three wether lambs.

In the region under No. 1 oats competi-
tion Canada ranked among the twenty-five
places. Avery of Kelso, Sask., was the
highest exhibitor from the western
provinces, placing third. M. W. La-
combe of Birle, Man., was ninth.

C. OF C. SENDS PROTEST ON COAL RATES CHANGE

Dominion Railway Commission
To Receive Strongly-Worded
Resolution.

CHATHAM BACKS

Declare Proposed Move Would
Destroy Capital
Assets.

With a unanimous voice the directors
of the London chamber of commerce, at
a meeting held yesterday afternoon,
decided to forward to the dominion
railway commission a strongly-worded
resolution protesting against any
change being made by the C. N. R. and
the C. P. R. in existing freight rates on
American coal coming in at Port Stan-
ley and Erieau, to points east of Wood-
stock.

A resolution was adopted also that
the name of the dominion chamber of
commerce to be formed be either "The
Canadian Chamber of Commerce" or
"The Chamber of Commerce of Cana-
da," the idea being to retain the full
significance of the term "chamber of
commerce" as introduced in Canada by
British people 145 years ago.

W. H. Wood, secretary of the cham-
ber, presented a draft resolution, which
resolution was placed in the hands of a
sub-committee, consisting of J. P.
Moore, K.C., J. E. Richards and Prof.
E. H. Morrow, for slight changes cal-
culated to strengthen the whole resolu-
tion.

Mr. Wood also tabled "a study" of
the whole situation as a support to the
resolution to be presented personally
before the railway commission at a later
date. It was agreed that this material,
or "brief," as Mr. Moore termed it,
should not be published at the present
time.

Onus on Railways.
It was pointed out by Mr. Richards
that the railway commission has asked
the two big railway companies to come
before them in connection with the
consolidation of the existing freight
rates, following this course because of
the many and strong protests that have
been made throughout this portion of
the province since the proposed change
was announced, and that, therefore, the
onus is clearly upon the C. N. R. and
the C. P. R. to establish their case. Mean-
while, since the commission has not as
yet set a date for this hearing, the di-
rectors agreed that the resolution should
be forwarded to the commission, and
that every effort be prosecuted, as in
the past few days, to secure all pos-
sible data to fortify the case for the
continuance of the present rates, pre-
paratory to opposing the C. P. R. and
the C. N. R. before the commission
when the case does come up.

The full text of the resolution, as
reunited by the sub-committee, is as
follows:

"Whereas the Dominion of Canada has
made large expenditures in developing
existing lake ports, so that they may
perform important economic functions for
the country, and

"Whereas established rates have been
in existence for twenty-five years, there-
by resulting in the encouragement of
capital outlay by public and private in-
stitutions which serve farming and in-
dustrial communities for private and
public utility purposes, and

"Whereas the Canadian National rail-
ways and the Canadian Pacific railway
system, under date of Oct. 23, 1922,
communication to the Pere Marquette
railway and the London & Port Stan-
ley, notifying them that the existing
rates on coal from Erieau (Rondeau)
and Port Stanley are to be cancelled on
Jan. 1, 1923, and

will result in destroying capital assets,
both private and public, with severe

Ontario:
"Be it resolved that the London cham-

The resolution relative to the name
of the dominion-wide chamber of com-
merce will be tabled by R. H. Dowler
and W. J. Brown at the national con-
ference meeting today to draft the con-
stitution, bylaws and rules and regula-
tions for such an organization.

The decision was made at the national
economic conference held at Winnipeg
recently to have representatives of the
chambers of commerce at London,
Toronto, Hamilton and Montreal confer
for the above purpose, and it is in this
connection that Mr. Dowler and Mr.
Brown are in Ottawa today.

WORKS BOARD SPENDS LESS THAN ESTIMATES

Final Meeting of Year Is
Held—Proposals Are
Laid Over.

Expenditures of the board of works
department for 1922 were slightly under
the budget for the year, according to
City Engineer W. P. Near, who sub-
mitted an annual statement to board
members at their final meeting for
1922, last night.

Little business was accomplished.
The majority of proposals were laid
over for the 1923 board to deal with.
T. C. McBride's gasoline tank agree-
ment met with the approval of the
aldermen, as did a parking proposal for
King street, between Richmond and
Wellington, presented by W. E. Saun-
ders, but both were laid aside.

A vote of thanks for the capable and
co-operative manner in which Ald.
Harry Bottrell held the chairmanship
was moved by Ald. James McCormick,
and seconded by Ald. C. M. Linnell.
