Both Murrell and Williams are standing up under the strain, neither of them showing the least sign of emotion when evidence against them is given by two or three witnesses corroborating each other.




ASKS GUARANTEE

Will Consider Plan as Basis of Concrete Settlement of Problem.

Associated Press Despatch. Paris, Oct. 17.-The Belgian reparation plan was presented to the reparation commission this morning by M. Delacroix, the Belgian member. The commission will meet again next week to consider it in detail. The Belgian reparation plan, drawn up after a detailed investigation of Germany's economic and financial posiions, places the minimum reparation Germany should be required to pay at 50,000,000,000 marks, to which is added \$2,000,000,000 marks in "C"

added \$2,000,000,000 marks in "C" bonds. Asserting that Germany can make annual payments of 3,000,000,000 gold marks, the plan recommends that this be guaranteed by hypothecation of the railroad and such monopolies as tobacco, coal, sugar, salt, wines and beer.

The Belgian foreign office recently suggested that its proposals be referred to the inter-allied reparation commission as the basis of a concrete plan for a settlement of the German indemnity question. The German indemnity question. allies agreed to this.

David Lloyd George Predicts Next Conflict Will Be

Worst in History.

PREFACE TO BOOK

Ex-British Premier Declares the Constant Quarreling of Nations Leading to Ruin.

Special to The Advertiser.

New York, Oct. 17 .- Another war and a worse one, is predicted by Lloyd George in his preface to his book, "Where Are We Going?" which will appear next week. Discussing the unsetled grievances among different nations of Europe, the expremier continues:

"And so the quarrel will go on to he final catastrophe, unless humanity one day sees the light and has the courage to follow it. But that day must not be too distant; otherwise it will be too late to save civilzation. The last conflict between

great nations has exposed the dervastating possibilities of modern science. Henceforth progress in the destructiveness of apparatus of war has been and will continue to be so rapid that conflict of tomorrow would spread ten times the desolation caused by the great war of 1914-18.

"There is a concentration of much scientific and mechanical skill on strengthening the machinery of devastation. Incredible progress — if progress be the word—has been made in the last three or four years in perfecting and increasing the shattering powen of this kind of deviltry. What will it be like five, ten, twenty years hence?

"President Wilson was strongly of the opinion that these documents ought to be treated as purely private conversations, and he objected to the communication of accounts given in the notes of the private conversa-tions, in which all present had spoken their minds with tions, in which all present had spoken their minds with great freedom, as improper use might afterwards be made of these documents. On the other hand, he did not object to the notes being communicated to special individuals in the personal confidence of members of the council. Though he looked upon certain statements, the conclusions and the ments, the conclusions and the actions as being official and, thereactions as being official and, there-fore, available in the appropriate of-fices, the actual conversations were private.
