MORE FIGHTING IN SAMOA. BLOODY BATTLE BETWEEN THE WARRING TRIBES.

Many Natives Killed and Wounded in the Contest—British and German Warships Interfere—The British Posture is Intervention, but Renew the Struggle.

Apia, Samoa, Aug. 15.—The ships of Great Britain and Germany have at last taken action with a view to ending the native disturbances which have heretofore appeared to be interminable.

Two skirmishes had taken place between the warring tribes, resulting in the killing of eight or ten natives and the wounding of many more, and besides the natives had become short of food, not having planted or looked after their crops.

They had taken to stealing from foreigners throughout the island. Their mode of life had produced a great deal of illness, much suffering and many deaths; and in the interests of common humanity interference by the powers became absolutely necessary.

Something had to be done to put a stop to the so-called warfare. It was with this end in view that the diplomatic and naval officials held several conferences. The ultimate result was a resolution to notify the rebels that they must disperse from their fortified stronghold at La Tuanau or suffer a shelling from the guns of the warships.

On Friday, August 10, the British ship Curacoa and the German warship Buzzard left Apia for La Tuanau. Arrived there the rebel chiefs were called on board the gunboats and informed their stronghold would be bombarded at nine o'clock the following morning.

During Friday morning the rebels evacuated the place. On Saturday morning the fortifications were shelled by the warships and all but destroyed. The king's warriors had been sent overland to cooperate with the gunboats in the attack on the rebels.

When the bombarding commenced and finished their work King Malietoa's warriors were signalled to advance and occupy the deserted position. Before the rebel warriors evacuated La Tuanau they set fire to all the huts in the vicinity, as well as their forts, the destruction of which the bombardiers finished, and destroyed all the bread fruit trees which were growing near.

The naval forces and communicated with the rebel chiefs and ordered them to disperse and surrender their arms. Instead of obeying the mandate, however, the rebels moved off toward Saualafa, which is less than fifteen miles from Apia, and it was decided to again advance upon them.

On Sunday morning the rebels and the King's warriors, who numbered fully 800, came together at Lufulu. The rebels made an attack and killed and wounded several of Malietoa's men. During all of Sunday there was desultory fighting, and the naval commanders resolved to again attack the rebels and deal with them decisively. Early on Monday morning, August 13, the Curacoa and Buzzard changed their positions and again opened fire on the rebels, killing and injuring a large number.

Simultaneously the King's warriors attacked them on shore. In the night the King lost six killed and several wounded.

At this writing it is impossible to ascertain a reliable estimate of the rebel loss, but it is known to have been heavy. The guns on the warships did deadly execution. On Monday evening the rebels sued for peace. Their chiefs were ordered to come on board the Curacoa on the following day. They obeyed the order and made promises of complete submission to Malietoa's rule, agreeing to pay their taxes, return to their homes and deliver up 100,000 rifles. Immediately after this meeting the Curacoa steamed away to Apia, believing the trouble was over.

The Curacoa's commander was eager to catch the mail steamer Marlposha that he might report the results of his operations to the British government. The Buzzard remained at the scene of action to receive the rifles from the rebels and see that they carried out their promises.

Great was the surprise of the commander of the Curacoa when at midnight last night the Buzzard signaled that Chief Tamatez, leader of the Aana rebels, had joined the Aua party with over 400 Aana men, and that these combined forces had attacked the king's warriors. Throughout the night the roar of the Buzzard's guns could be heard. This morning the Curacoa got under way again and left for the scene of the trouble.

Capt. Gibson left, determined to demand complete surrender of the rebels, and unless the rebels are submissive the slaughter will undoubtedly be terrible, as his gunners will fire to kill. It is now certain that unless vigorous measures are taken the position of the foreigners here will be critical.

At the hour of the sailing of the Marlposha it is reported the rebels have made complete surrender, but the rumor lacks confirmation.
