Unfortunately for Arnprior after  
the factory was erected and the ma-

possible to procure the raw material  
required. The machinery is packed  
ready to shipment."

Any person who has talked with  
Mr. Richards could not help but be  
convinced that he himself was the vic-  
tim. When he went to the Ontario  
town mentioned it was not he who  
formed the company, but the busi-  
ness men of that town, and they as-  
sured him that there was unlimited  
supply of hardwood, but after erect-  
ing the machinery Mr. Richards found  
that the supply was limited and the  
price was prohibitive.

Mr. Richards seems to be an honest  
mechanic, and that his machines  
are all he claims for them he has  
letters to prove.

This would be a clean little indus-  
try and some move toward organi-  
zation should be made.

## MR. LABILLIOL'S CRITICISES GOVERNMENT'S ACTS IN BRILLIANT SPEECH

Was Listened to With Close Attention by Whole House  
---Colonization Subject Urged by  
Our Representative.

### MR. BYRNE SPEAKS.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 24—Re-  
spected members of the House of  
Monday afternoon, when Hon. Mr. La-  
billiol was heard. Mr. Labilliol was  
in excellent form and did credit not  
only to the party with which he is  
affiliated but to the House as a whole.

In his speech Mr. Labilliol was  
moderate and in that very fact lay  
the strength of his criticism. He  
showed with close attention as he  
exposed the weaknesses of the govern-  
ment's policy and administration.

The Restigouche man was particu-  
larly strong in his reference to the  
importance of colonization. He ex-  
pressed his keen disappointment that  
the speech from the throne, placed  
in the hands of the Governor by the  
cabinet, had nothing whatever to say  
on this most important subject. Im-  
migration may be a subject for con-  
sideration, he said, but surely it is  
of far more importance to the welfare  
of the province that something be  
done to encourage our own people,  
particularly our young people, to stay  
in the home land and aid in its de-  
velopment. This matter has been em-  
phasized before, he continued, during  
recent years it was brought before the  
government, our own young people have  
been demanding that something be  
done. Quebec people have shown their  
willingness to settle in large num-  
bers along the line of the International  
and on the Blue-shed tract. In  
spite of these facts, the government  
has ignored this question of vital im-  
portance. In so doing they have in-  
jured the reputation of the province  
and the Agricultural Commission and  
the recommendations of the Farmers' and  
Dairymen's Association.

It is all very well to have an im-  
migration bureau set up at St. John and  
pay \$2,000 for an advertisement in a  
London paper but surely the northern  
districts of the province should not be  
closed. Up in Restigouche, he said,  
there are many acres of land awaiting  
settlement. True, they are under lease  
in many cases but I have confidence  
in the spirit of the men who have  
these leases and I am sure that look-  
ing to the future development of the  
province of which we are all proud, they  
will be glad to assist in any way  
within their power in the develop-  
ment of our own young people. It is  
the duty of the government to encour-  
age our people to stay home and work  
for the advancement of our native land.

Mr. Labilliol went on to point out  
that the minister may say that he  
is ready to have set aside some acres  
of land for colonization. This, he  
said, is quite true but the land is such  
that it is not suitable for the purpose  
and young men who have craved  
it for the purpose of seeing whether  
or not it is suitable for them to  
settle upon have gone away from it  
disgusted.

Recently, he said, the government  
has been asked for 30,000 acres along  
the line of the International and he  
said 20,000 acres in the Blue-shed  
tract. The men who came before the  
government did not ask that the land  
be given them, but they were willing  
to pay for it. For a long time the  
government gave them no answer  
whatever and since notice has been  
asked of the request really nothing  
has been done. Thus, men interested  
in an undertaking which might yield  
most beneficial results to the province  
have been given no encouragement,  
but the very reverse. Moreover, the  
provincial treasury is the poorer by  
\$50,000 which these men were willing  
to pay for the desired land.

Mr. Labilliol was also very out-  
spoken in regard to another matter of  
importance in many rural districts.  
This is the control of automobiles.  
The government boasts of its High-  
way Act, with its increased taxation,  
but it does nothing to safeguard the  
interests of the farmers and their fam-  
ilies in the sections where automob-  
iles are used. The man of means  
may have his auto but surely in sim-  
ple justice farmers should not be sub-  
jected to danger and loss through the  
frightening of their horses by the ma-  
jor vehicle. There should be some re-  
strictions on the running of these cars  
—certain days should be set aside for  
their use of the highways. If this  
were done farmers and their wives  
and children would not be liable to  
danger through the frightening of  
their horses; they could do their busi-  
ness more comfortably and mer-  
chant.

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chants, too, would profit as under  
present conditions many farmers send  
to stores outside the province, rather  
than risk the drive to the home store  
over roads which automobiles fre-  
quent.

Mr. Labilliol also criticized the  
government for its lack of progres-  
sive agricultural policy. Nothing has  
been done, he said, which shows a  
thought for the farmers' interests.  
True, the number of agricultural so-  
cieties has been increased—but that  
means a lessening of the grain to  
each one and the consequent hamper-  
ing of its work. Horse importations  
have been made, one the importation  
of race horses from New Brunswick  
Kensington, but the farmers have not  
benefited through them. In the case  
of the last importation the farmers had  
to bid against horse dealers and work  
given no special treatment which  
would justify the view that the gov-  
ernment is sincere in its profession of  
desire to advance their interests.

As for the fruit raising on which  
government speakers have laid so  
much stress to their own glorification,  
Mr. Labilliol pointed out that the  
foundations for success were well laid  
by the old government years ago. Ex-  
hibits of New Brunswick agricultural  
products were sent abroad nineteen  
years ago and won honors, yet this  
government would have the people be-  
lieve that never until Hazen rule, or  
marble, did New Brunswick farmers  
meet with any success in this, nor  
indeed in any other way.

The Highway Act, said Mr. Labil-  
liol, is another failure. On all sides  
there is complaint. The machinery  
is too complicated. The operations  
under the act are turned to pos-  
session. From \$100,000 sent abroad  
the St. John orchard is in lamentable  
shape. In Kent the orchard would  
hardly be recognized. These he went  
on to say, are the orchards which the  
government have done so much for  
fruit raising in New Brunswick. And  
perhaps all this impressed most on  
the farmers to whom Dr. Landry was  
speaking.

In the evening Mr. Byrne of Glou-  
cester, took the floor. He exposed  
Dr. Landry's constant inconsistency  
in action. He pointed out that in  
the St. John orchard is in lamentable  
shape. In Kent the orchard would

on to say, are the orchards which the  
government have done so much for  
fruit raising in New Brunswick. And  
perhaps all this impressed most on

These facts make clear Dr. Landry's  
remarkable consistency and the no-  
table accuracy of what constitutes  
accuracy of statement.

Mr. Byrne spoke very strongly in  
regard to the action of the St. John  
orchard in reducing the size of the  
logs from 18-10 to 16-8. No greater  
mistake could have been made, he  
said. Rather, the size of the logs  
should have been increased. Of  
course more stumps is to be tempo-  
rarily collected; but the reduction  
in the size of the log must inevitably  
be disastrous to the forestry. The op-  
inion of Hon. Mr. Sweney, it may be  
noted, is that if the present regula-  
tions are adhered to, direct taxation  
will be inevitable in the comparatively  
few years when our forests will have  
been almost exhausted.

Mr. Byrne's speech by the way, was  
a most effective one, to which fur-  
ther reference will be made.

## NEW BRUNSWICK EDITORS WILL MEET AT ST. JOHN

Winter Port Board of Trade Sends  
Out Invitations to Meet and  
Discuss Important Matters

It has been suggested to the St.  
John Board of Trade that the inter-  
ests of this province might be ad-  
vanced by a free and informal inter-  
change of views among the editors of New  
Brunswick newspapers. The time  
seems ripe for a persistent and  
concerted effort to bring about the  
spread of information, the ad-  
vance of public opinion, the in-  
crease of public confidence among  
the people, and the general  
welfare of the province.

The business men and the press of  
St. John, like those of other commu-  
nities, are liable to regard matters from  
a local point of view, and there is no  
doubt that it would be helpful to all  
if leaders of opinion in each district of  
the province could frankly discuss  
together matters of general and local  
concern.

The editors of newspapers are in  
direct contact with the people, their  
problems, possibilities and difficulties  
of the districts where they live and  
work. They should be able to discuss  
to such a conference much informa-  
tion and many useful suggestions. The  
result of such a conference as is  
proposed would be a closer under-  
standing of the provincial situation  
from many points of view, and a prac-  
tical co-operation for political pro-  
gress.

Among the purposes in view are the  
discovery of means whereby the peo-  
ple of this Province may be kept at  
home, settings obtained, life in the  
provinces be made more attractive and  
prosperous, natural resources devel-  
oped, new industries established, old  
ones assisted, tourist travel increased,  
public sentiment encouraged to come  
here, and a spirit of provincial loyalty  
to be promoted, consistent with and  
helpful to the larger national spirit.

## WOULD FAVOR A STRINGENT MEASURE

Forestry Convention Seems to be in  
Favor of Prohibition of  
Pulp Wood

FREDERICTON, Feb. 23—A deter-  
mined attempt to have conven-  
tion place itself on record as favoring  
the prohibition of the export of pulp  
wood characterized the first day of the  
eventual annual convention of the Can-  
adian Forestry Association. EX-  
President Snowball of Chatham led in  
a way that brought about the adop-  
tion of the resolution. The attack followed  
a paper by C. E. Oak, manager of the  
New Brunswick Lumber Co., entitled  
"The Pulp Wood Question in New  
Brunswick." He received the support  
of a majority of the delegates.  
Senator Edwards, chairman of the  
committee on the cause of free export,  
opposed the resolution. Mr. Oak's  
paper, it was decided to wait until  
after Mr. Beveridge's paper is read to-  
morrow. There is little doubt that  
the resolution will be carried.
