School Trustee Elections.

The minister of education has introduced a bill for the consolidation and amendment of the school law, which promises to be of great service to all who have to do with educational matters. For years school trustees, teachers, and even county inspectors have been wandering in a maze of doubt among the many rules, regulations, and interpretations issued from time to time by the department. Frequent reference to which has been had for the decision of knotty points, that have not always been decided consistently. Mr. Ross proposes to simplify matters that these difficulties shall be removed.

Mr. Ross has so far yielded to the popular demand for a change in the method of electing trustees as to give boards of education in cities, towns, incorporated villages, and townships wherein there are township boards, the optional privilege of holding trustee elections upon the same day as municipal elections, and under the ballot. For some reason, at which we can only guess, this privilege is withheld from separate school boards, which are required to go on in the old groove. There is no good or even plausible reason why the ballot should not be employed in school as in other elections. If it tends to the greater purity, quietness and freedom of political and municipal contests, it must surely have a similar tendency in school elections. It has been openly charged that separate school elections have been bulldozed at the polls by clerical influences, and the pains which are taken to keep the ballot out of the hands of school trustees will convince the general public that these influences have come to the source of school legislation. It is much to be regretted that the minister of education should have marked an otherwise commendable measure by making an invidious distinction against Roman Catholic electors in the matter of the ballot.

From a study of the blue books the Ottawa Free Press learns that Nicholas Flood Davis has had nearly \$15,000 worth of government paper in six years. His weekly paper, the Regina Leader, has drawn over \$1700 from the public treasury for advertisements. None of the daily organs have fared so well. At this rate Lucy Macdonald's poet laureate is a more expensive luxury than the queen's.

It is a question yet unsettled whether the limit in the size of steamships has not been reached and passed. The new Cunarder, the Servia, arrived at New York on Thursday, the fourteenth day out, having experienced heavy weather and sustained considerable damage. The comparatively smaller Celtic of the White Star line, passed through the same weather, sustained no damage and got in a day before the other.

Russia, like the felines, evidently thinks that England's misdeeds are her opportunity. There is no respect at St. Petersburg for a nation, friendly or otherwise, wrestling with almost overwhelming odds, and therefore it is in no wise surprising to hear that Russia is meditating an advance on Afghanistan.

Mr. Manning is susceptible to a suggestion. He has ordered the removal of the obnoxious fence at the head of Jordan street, or at least he has had the end boards knocked out and the sidewalk left clear. Between the pedestrians and the wheelbarrow is now a board barrier which Mr. Manning has doubtless left for the protection of the public.

The need of a divorce court is quite set forth among the public men at the capital. It is about time that the relations of the most vital importance to both the men and women of Canada should cease to be at the mercy of a tribunal in no way fitted to deal with a subject requiring the most experienced legal acumen. There are things to be checked and punished which are, as much social importance as the repression of occasional drinking or the rigid observance of the Sabbath. Mr. Charlton, who by the way has never explained his traveling from Naples to Ottawa on a Sunday with a Grand Trunk pass in his pocket, may be expected to lend his aid to the establishment of the divorce court.

How to Stop the Dynamite.

Editor World: I think we Mr. Pringle that no government can stop the outrages of dynamites. It is high time to stop on this matter, for when you hear the rattle the snake is not far off. During the recent excitement all blame was laid on the Catholic church. Yet I have in Toronto old jail the minister and five German Lutherans (Finns) and covered with them. Now, I suppose people will again in general blame the Catholic church, though nihilists, socialists, Communists, Catholics and Finns are all working under the same cloth. Every sin is punished already in this world in its own way. Infamous laws in some countries drive people away from the country. Governments are protecting

secret societies and secret societies of godless people turn against them. Often also capitalists oppress the poor workmen, and in turn the exasperated father of a family will turn against the rich oppressor. The governments, the employers, should think of this. An iron chain may last long but it will break at last. No further off than yesterday, an Italian pointed his pistol at a Grand Trunk officer who in the discharge of his duty had ordered the man off his employer's premises. The brutes must go, and any man who resorts to a pistol or knife, even to defend himself in a row, displays brutal instincts. ONLOOKER.

Five hundred bushels of barley were purchased at prices ranging from 70c to 72c, the bulk of it selling at 81c. Oats brought 33c and 34c, peas 57c to 60c. Timothy hay sold at \$11 to \$14, clover at \$7 to \$10. Straw \$7 to \$10. Potatoes are selling by the load at 40c, single bags 50c. Apples may be had at \$1.50 to \$1.75 per barrel. ST.
