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RECIPROCITY IN B.M.

THE JAMAICAN DELEGATES AT OTTAWA. An Excellent Chance to Increase Canadian Trade. Proposals That are Favorably Received—An Excellent Chance to Increase Canadian Trade.

OTTAWA, June 2.—The Jamaica delegates who arrived in the city last night had interviews with several members of parliament to-day and conferred freely on their propositions for reciprocity between Jamaica and Canada. Sugar, rum and tropical fruits are the chief commodities which the delegates desire to have admitted from Jamaica into the Dominion.

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DEATH OF "DICK" JACKSON.

A YOUNG AND WELL KNOWN COLORED CITIZEN GOES OVER WITH THE MASTERS. Richard Jackson, probably the best known colored man in Toronto, died at the residence of his sister, No. 21 Elizabeth street, at 12.30 yesterday afternoon, after an irregular illness of six weeks' duration. Deceased was familiarly known as "Dick" Jackson. At the time of his death he was 38 years of age, and had lived all his days in Toronto. "Dick" followed the avocation of barber and hair-dresser, and in his day occupied several principal locations in the centre of the city. Probably the most pained and best known of his stunts was that now occupied by Mr. T. Lovvibrug, broker, adjoining The World office, where he had for a partner Rube Custon, who long ago had to shake the rascal on account of a severe attack of rheumatism. In this shop such well known gentlemen as Ald. Baxter, John Ald. Phipps, James Cooper, J. C. Smith, Colonel Arthur, J. E. Smith, J. G. Beard, etc., were wont to congregate, and while "Dick" deftly scraped their heads he entertained them with the latest gossip of the day—political, personal and social. Whenever Billy Florence came to town he invariably sought out the affable "Dick" to mow the stiff stubble from his fat round face, and a similar face possessed by "Buckshot" Fleming while that illustrious personage occupied a room at the county jail. "Dick" was a familiar face to one of the principal sights of King street was the deceased and "Gov." Blackburn walking arm-in-arm through the streets of the Dominion.
