Here and there one finds a dairyman who hesitates about taking up cow testing because of the initial expense of about three dollars for the necessary outfit of scales and

This would seem to be an extreme case of "Penny wise and pound foolish." So many examples are constantly cropping up of distinct saving through the small expenditure that they should be noted for the en-couragement of those who still hes-

Cows had been bought at auction time after time, discarded by owners who were evidently absolutely ignorant of their high value as good producers. After one or two months' test the new owners have often refused \$50 and \$100 on their bargains. That is a pretty quick return on the cow testing outfit expenditure.

In fact amongst such discards at auction were picked up one or two world's champions, worth thousands of dollars.

This vital fact should not be overooked: Hundreds of poor cows are being kept today at huge expense of whose low value the owners are also probably ignorant. Yet a three dollar outfit would help discover them, soon turning the present loss into distinct savings

Then, thanks to that small expense, many dairymen are now making an additional income of three hundred dollars from twenty cows, because the poorest have been discarded. It will abundantly pay every dairyman to keep dairy records.

MILK PER ACRE

Dominion Department Of Agriculture Dairy Commissioner's Branch, Ottawa,

If it may be assumed that the farm of the average factory patron is fairly well adapted to dairying, that the patron himself is inclined towards dairying, rather than, let us say, fruit growing, and that his cows are fairly good, then it will be of in terest to note how the farm is made

to respond to this dairy inclination. There are frequently noticed yields as low as 250 pounds of milk per acre cultivated including pas ture, but some good patrons obtain 750 and 800 pounds per acre. Even plenty of authentic records of 1,100 and 2,100 pounds of milk per acre. It should not be extremely difficult to obtain more than this, even 2,500

or 3,000 pounds. This latter figure is a long, long way ahead of the yields already mentioned of only 250 pounds which dairy farm in Canada, and is indicative of the possibilities in reach of the factory patron who is really

It is questionable if the average yield per acre in Ontario is much more than 600 pounds of milk. BIG GRAIN COMPETITION

New Features of List of Canadian National Exhibition

A Grain and Sheaf Competition open to world is an added feature of this year's Prize List of the Canadian National Exhibitors, which is now being distributed. The prizes in this competition are \$100 and Medal each for Spring wheat, Fall wheat, barley, oats, Flint corn, Dent corn, beans and peas. All exhibits must be the product of the crop of 1913 or 1914 and be sent through the Minister of Agriculture, Commissioner or Secretary of the Province or State, of Officer in charge of an Agricultural Department. The exhibit shall consist of two bushels of grain in sack, accompanied by one of grain in sack, accompanied by one sheaf of the same grain. Sheaves are not required for entries of beans and

The other departments of the Prize List have been carefully revised, and the total amount to be awarded for Live Stock and other products of the farm and home is \$55,000. The List has been specially framed to protect the interests of the small exhibitor.

It is not generally known that the field crops of Ontario greatly exceed in value the total yield of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Further improved methods of farming, due to the experimental and demonstration work of the Ontario Agricultural College, are increasing the yield annually. While the peach crop may be considerably below the average, there is reason to hope that other fruits, grains and roots will be better than ever.

The effect of a good crop, not only in the west, but in Ontario, will be an easing in the money market and a quick-

The prairie is a treasure-house, but the good soil of this province, which nourishes the forest as well as the garden, is not yet doing its whole duty or returning to us all the wealth with which it is en-dowed.

The Farmer's Mutual Lightning Protected Insurance Company of Michigan, as its name implies, insures only rodded buildings, and that only after the Company's inspectors have carefully examined the rodding and approved of it. During 1909-1912, inclusive, in a business which for the four years totalled \$55,172,075 risk this Company paid only \$32.00 for damage to buildings by lightning, in three small claims, all traceable to defects in rodding which were overlooked by the Company's inspector.

The Patrons' Mutual Fire Insurance Company, which also does business all over the State of Michigan, insures both rod-ded and unrodded buildings. In the same four years, 1909-1912, this Company, on a total risk of \$59,567,272, paid lightning damage on buildings to the extent of \$32,268.78, which is 1008 times as much as the Protected Company paid. Of this loss the damage to rodded buildings consisted of three small claims only—and 20 per cent. of their buildings are rodded. Deducting these rodded risks, we see that the \$32,-269 damage occurred on unrodded risks amounting to \$47,-753,818. At this rate the loss on the \$55,172,175 of unrodded risks, the same as the Protected Company, would be \$37,282, which is 1168 times as great as the loss on the same amount of properly rodded building.
