TEN BROECK'S GREAT RACE.
(From the Kentucky Live Stock Record.)
Promptly at three o'clock the horses were called, and at the first attempt went away side and all. The pace was slow for the first mile, and many thought the horse destroyed his chances by its slowness, and the running in the second and third miles was so fast, that if the horse was not one of the most wonderful that ever lived, he would not have been able to accomplish the greatest feat in the annals of the turf in either hemisphere. Just to think of it, the first mile was run in 1:52½, the two middle miles 3:32½, the three miles 5:25, and the last three miles, 5:23, the race 7:15½, beating F. J. Lowercraft's time 3½ seconds, and in twenty minutes after the race looked as fresh as a daisy, and able to repeat the astonishing performance. The horse won the race upon

F. Robinson, Jr., Lexington, Ky., M. Lewis Clark, Jr., president of the Association, acting as starter. The timers were Col. J. Russ Butler, Louisville, Ky., Major B. G. Thomas, Lexington, Ky., and the writer, B. G. Bruce.
The race was of such great importance that the timers were extra particular in noting the time of every quarter, and were each armed with split second watches, and there was not a fraction of a second difference between them in the entire race from start to finish. There is no question about the time; most of the outside timers made it from a quarter to a half and three-quarter seconds faster than the official timers.

Mr. F. B. Harper had the greatest confidence in his horse accomplishing the feat, or else he would never have let him undertake it for so small an amount as \$1,000. But he said it was reputation that he desired, and most fully did the noble steed respond to the demands of his owner, and write his name high on the scroll of fame, "the heir of all the ages in the far-most files of time." Time is stationery and a fixture, and it was no small feat to undertake to beat it without special preparation and care, but Mr. Harper and his immediate friends had the utmost confidence, and the horse did not betray their confidence, "and panting Time said at a run in vain." The horse is most aptly and appropriately named. Mr. R. Ten Broeck was the owner of Lexington, and was the first turfman bold enough to challenge time; he imported Phaeton, the sire of Ten Broeck, and his name and the horses will go down in history indissolubly linked together. That the horse could have run some two or three seconds faster if the pace had been properly regulated, we have not a doubt, but as it is he has left a mark that will take years to wipe out. We would well and linger longer over this grand achievement if we had space.

THE RACE.
Ten Broeck led off at a slow pace, Add second, the former leading a length at the quarter, 0:29½. At the half, 57½ seconds, it was the same. Leaving the half-mile the pace was improved, the three-quarters in 1:25½, the mile in 1:52½. Passing the stand the jockey was informed that the pace was too slow, and he ran to the quarter in 2:19½, the half in 2:46, the three-quarters in 3:12½, and two miles in 8:38½. The second mile was run in 1:45½, and the boy was told that he was now going too fast, but he did not slacken up the pace much; the two and a quarter was 4:02, the two and a half 4:31½, the two and three-quarters 4:59½, and the three miles in 5:25. Add was now out of the race, so far as benefit to Ten Broeck was concerned, and Nrey Halo was turned in with him at the three-quarter pole in the third mile. Every one supposed that the horse had destroyed his chances of beating the time by the slowness of the first mile, and the pace in the second and third miles, which was run in 3:32½, but he did not slacken his speed more than to the eye; the three and a quarter miles was 5:52½, the three and a half 6:19½, the three and three-quarters 6:47½, and he passed under the string amid the shouts of the enthusiastic crowd in the astonishing time of 7:15½. Add was beaten some hundred yards, and we regret that we are unable to give his time; for it was a much better performance than many were inclined to credit him with.

THE PIPER'S CHALLENGE.—Mr. Ross, of West Zora, stated in reference to the challenge of Messrs. Ross, of Lucknow, and Smith, of Hamilton, challenging him to play general bag pipe music for \$100 a side, that he is willing to accept it. He further states that he is willing to play for a bet of from \$500 to \$1,000 a side, each player to appoint one judge and the judges a third. The challenge is good for any time between now and Christmas, before which time the playing must come off.

THE COUNTESS OF DUFFERIN.
The debts incurred by the owner of the yacht Countess of Dufferin will be settled by Messrs. Cameron & Co., of 23 South William street, that firm having received a cheque yesterday from Major Gifford. The debts in all will amount to nearly \$2,000. It is said that Major Gifford has given instructions for a suit to be begun against Mr. McRoberts, for unlawfully seizing and disposing of the lug-foresail belonging to the Countess of Dufferin, to satisfy a claim of \$48. The foresail was valued at \$250 and was sold for \$100. Messrs. Cameron have the yacht for sale, but so far they have received no offer, and unless they do so in a short time the yacht is to return to Canadian waters.—N.Y. World

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.
OBED. SMITH, OF THE HALIFAX FISHERMEN'S CREW, AND HIS BROTHER DROWNED.
Another sad drowning accident occurred in Halifax harbour on Sunday morning, which cast a gloom over the community. One of the victims is Obed. Smith, the bow oarsman of the champion four-oared crew who distinguished themselves at Philadelphia. Obed. and Mark Smith, brothers, started at two a.m. for their home in Sambro in their schooner boat of sixteen tons. They had five tons of ballast, two children of coal, and much of their winter stores on board. When boating across the lower portion of the harbour, between Red and Point Pleasant bays, the boat was run down by the mail steamer Nova Scotian, bound in from Baltimore. Obed. Smith was amidship, and when the steamer struck the boat on quarter, Mark rushed and caught hold of him round the waist when the main sail fell on them both. A woman named Lulu was a passenger with them, and was sitting in the bows. She caught hold of a couple of planks as the boat went down, and they floated her until she was rescued by her brother-in-law, who was in a whaler some distance astern when the accident occurred. The Smiths were not seen since the morning, and it is supposed that they sank with the boat.
