The Liverpool (Eng.) Mercury on February 10th speaking of the Schools for the Deaf and Dumb of that place says: "The year 1893 had been a year of trial and success in the education of the deaf and dumb, the English Government having at last recognised the claims of the afflicted class by passing an Act of Parliament providing for their education. The provisions of the Act were: (1) compulsory education of all deaf and dumb children between the ages of 5 and 16. (2) Placing power in the hands of local boards or the recognised authorities of administering the Act, by sending deaf children to certified schools, and paying the maintenance there, such sum to be afterward deducted and appropriated by the Education Department. (3) Allowing powers now in the hands of guardians. (4) Government to give a large sum of grant, the amount of which has not yet been fixed.
