The man in Kansas or Colorado, can thus buy a package of the finest tea in New York, almost at the wholesale price; or if he wishes a pair of heavy boots, each boot can be done up separately, and mailed to him. To meet the great demand which has thus arisen from this most convenient method of enabling any person with a few postage stamps to be as independent as though he owned an express line, Messis.
