





#### HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

CANNED CORN .- Put a quart of canne corn in a saucepan; boil in its own liqu fifteen minutes. Add half a teacup of crea and a teaspoonful of butter; season with pe per and salt.

POTATO PIE. - Mash through a straige boiled sweet or white potatoes, and to even pint of pulp add three pints of sweet mis a teacup of sugar, four eggs, a tablespoonful butter, a pinch of salt and flavouring to task Bake with a rich undercrust.

BUNS.-Two cups of milk, one and our half cups of sugar, two thirds of a cup of be ter, one cup of yeast and salt to taste. L them rise over night; in the morning makes buns, put in tins to rise till very light. Bush them over with sweetened milk.

OMELET.-Beat five eggs, whites and yell separately, and then together, add a coffee cup of milk, salt and pepper to taste, butte a frying-pan and pour in the mixture, set or the back of the range or stove and cook ren slowly until it stiffens; then serve.

BREAD GRIDDLE-CAKES .- Bread-crumb when soaked in cold water, make very cin griddle-cakes. For nearly two quarts of be ter use three slices with water enough a cover, one egg, sour milk enough to make thin batter, one teaspoonful of soda, one-bit teaspoonful of salt and flour to stiffen.

PINEAPPLE PIE -Peel and grate a pize apple, add to it a cup of sweet cream, a cq of sugar and half a cup of butter beaten in gether, the beaten yelks of five eggs and lash the beaten whites. Line pie-plates with pasm fill with the pineapple mixture and have u upper crust.

Repeat for a few night alternately, and in the morning remove the paste and the corpses to a convenient place

A BRILLIANT WHITEWASH .- Take a bil bushel of clean, unslacked lime, slack it wil boiling water, covering it during the proces to keep in the steam. Strain the liquid through a fine sieve or strainer and add to it a per of clean salt previously well dissolved a warm water, three pounds of ground m boiled to a thin paste and stirred in boiling bot, half-pound of Spanish whiting, and on pound of clean glue hich has been previous dissolved by first soaking it well and the banging over a slow fire in a small kettle with another kettle of water. Add five gallons water to the whole mixture, stir 🥞 well 22 let it stand a few days covered from dirt. should be put on quite hot. It can be kept a kettle on a portable furnace. It is said that one pint of this mixture will cover a square yard upon the outside of a house, if properly applied.
