This disposition was well reproved by an ancient preacher in a parable of two hermits who each planted an olive tree near his own cave. One of those trees lived; the other died. One day the owner of the dead tree, seeing the living one in front of his brother's cave, asked, "How came that goodly plant there?"

His brother replied, "I planted it, and God blessed it, and it grew."

"Ah, brother," rejoined the first hermit, "I too planted an olive, and when I thought it wanted water I asked God to give it rain, and the rain came; when I thought it needed sun, I asked, and the sun shone; and when I deemed that it needed strengthening, I prayed, and and the frost came—God gave me all I demanded for my tree as I saw fit, yet it is dead"
