THE RUSSIAN NOVELISTS. By VICOMTE E. M. DE VOGUE. Translated by JANE LORING EDMANDS. 12mo. \$1.50.

All lovers of Russian fiction and all students of the great social movements of the day will be charmed by the perusal of this book. It treats in a comprehensive manner not only the literature of Russia, but the influences which shaped it, and shows the distinctive styles of its great authors, with a keen analysis of their different works.

ROYAL GIRLS AND ROYAL COURTS. By Mrs. M. E. W. SHERWOOD. 12mo. \$1.25.

It is doubtful whether the old writers of fairy tales ever told more delightful stories than these true ones of Mrs. Sherwood's. They give a most graphic picturing of the home life of princesses, with a clear insight into royal courts, showing their characteristic manners and customs, in the author's peculiarly graceful and brilliant style.

THOUGHTS OF BEAUTY AND WORDS OF WISDOM. From the writings of JOHN RUSKIN; compiled by ROSE PORTER. 12mo. \$1.00.

It was a felicitous idea to garner from Ruskin's many books some of his most beautiful sayings, that the general reader might be brought within the circle of his teachings, and made familiar with the exquisite thoughts and sentiments of a man whose soul was aflame with enthusiasm for the pure in nature and in art.

There is probably no woman of our country who has a richer store of varied reminiscences than Mrs. Fremont. From her birth she has enjoyed the privileges of high social and official position, and her personal acquaintance with distinguished personages has been unusually large. Hence the wide range and the historic interest of these "Souvenirs," which describe in easy, flowing language early days in Washington, romantic episodes of later life in the far West, and delightful experiences with royalty in various European courts.

It is a book of valuable information which will be read with satisfaction and pleasure, and even young people will enjoy it as they would stories of adventure, from the peculiar raciness and brilliancy of its descriptions.

In the form of familiar talks, the various mysteries of the human body are brought down to the understanding and the admiration of a group of children, who learn by practical demonstration.

LIFE OF JAMES RUSSELL LOWELL. By E. E. BROWN. 12mo. \$1.25.

The tone of this volume is sympathetic, and the numerous facts gathered from Lowell and his friends, with the apt quotations interspersed, give it a personal quality that is peculiarly attractive, since our knowledge of the man is less general than our admiration of his genius.

GLADYS: A ROMANCE. By MARY G. DARLING. 12mo. \$1.25, paper, 25 cents.

A story of "society people" of the best class, sketched with much power yet with fine delicacy of touch. There is an element of reserved strength in the characters, which makes itself felt even in Gladys, with all the charm of her girlish grace and beauty. Life at Bar Harbor is skilfully drawn, and also at Memphis during the scourge of yellow fever in 1878, the description of which is remarkably vivid. The incident of the brave little woman doctor who kept a mob of panic stricken, desperate men at bay, while defending a band of little waifs left fatherless and motherless by the fever, is strictly true.
